Gives Wards to Make a 50 Per Cent Cut on Legislator's Salaries—Says the Public Demands It.

On recommendation of the committee on judiciary, Bassett's bill, asking money for the beginning of the trial in the Supreme Court of the State was referred.

Bassett introduced a bill for an act to make a special appropriation for the support of the University of Utah.

The proposed amendment reads as follows:

"This is hereby appropriated for the support of the University of Utah, now and including January 1st to July 1st, 1896, the sum of \$30,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary. We make no appropriation now for the beginning of each quarter year of the term for which the appropriation is made." The act is to take effect from and after passing.

The Dennis' bill was under consideration when the News received a report of the proceedings closed in the day.

House Proceedings.
