DENIES AND EXPLAINS.

Mrs. Brown-Potter is disturbed about certain reports, ostensibly originating in London and published in the United States, and is emphatic, almost to the point of anger, in her denials and explanations. When I visited her in her apartments at the Savoy hotel yesterday she conversed freely about the statement that she would never return to the United States because of the influence of her son-in-law, James A. Stillman, and his father's Standard Oil millions. She also had something to say about the reports that she syndicate now backing her is disposed to relinquish its financial support in the present production of "Du Barry" at the Savoy theater.

THIS IS PLAIN.

"You may absolutely deny the statement that I have said I would not return to the United States," said Mrs. Potter. "Nor have I entered into any agreement with the Standard Oil interests for a monetary or other consideration upon this or any other matter. I want it distinctly understood that never in my whole career have I received one penny from any source except as the result of my own work, and I am under obligations to no one in a business or any other way." Mrs. Potter would not discuss the social relations between her daughter and her relatives and herself but added: "I treat all my movements solely as business propositions and it is perfectly ridiculous that all these things should be said about me. I have never compromised with any one and never will."

"As for the success of 'Du Barry,'" added Mrs. Potter, "I have been going vastly better than was to be expected during Lent. I am in perfect harmony with my associates, and have no other plans than the continuance of the play after holy week."

There is another point upon which Mrs. Potter is sorely vexed, she dislikes reference to herself by the press of the United States or Mrs. James Brown-Potter. She wants it distinctly understood once and for all time that she is not now Mrs. James Brown-Potter, Mrs. James Brown-Potter was Miss Mary Handy. The London Mrs. Potter signed herself Cora Urquhart Potter and prefers to be known as Mrs. Potter, or as Mrs. Brown-Potter (phonetic) which latter style she uses in her management of the Savoy theater.

American Scheme to Assist British Unemployed

Special Correspondence.

LONDON, May 2.—There seems to be no doubt about the success of the various "unemployed colonies" which the British local government board is establishing with the aid of Joseph Fels of Philadelphia.

An opportunity was given newspaper men this week to visit the most important of these "colonies"—at Holesley bay on the sea-coast in Suffolk—and all that was seen there bore evidence to the wisdom of the American socialist's idea. That idea is, of course, to give the unemployed who at present are crowding the London poorhouses, a chance to earn their "keep" by agricultural work in the country. With this object Mr. Fels is acquiring derelict farms all over the country, and turning them over, rent free for three years, to the local government board. The first he acquired was Sumpner's farm of 100 acres, in Essex, which cost the American manufacturer \$10,000 and is now in the hands of the local board of guardians.

The men from the London workhouses are sent to these farms and set to work at reclaiming them. The men get only their board and no wages, married men, besides being "found" are paid \$3.75 a week, but are allowed only six-pence a day for their "keep" by themselves the balance being sent to their wives in London. The farms which the men are reclaiming—under the direction of practical agriculturists, will, of course, increase greatly in value when they become productive once more. At the end of three years they will be purchased by the local authorities—otherwise they will revert to

The Holesley "colony," visited the other day, is said to be typical of the rest. It comprises 1,200 acres and on these are now working 150 men who, five weeks ago, were numbered with the hordes of unemployed in London. The dockers, carpenters and bricklayers for the most part, by trade, they were found digging the ground and sowing rows of potatoes, onions and asparagus. At the end of every month they are allowed to go to London and look for work at their own trade. If they fail to find it in the course of time there is a good chance for them in the country at their new calling—agriculture.


