Special Correspondence. Provo, Utah Co., May 10 .- Mayor Roylance's disapproval of the Electric company's bill for April was presented at the meeting of the city council last evening. The reason given for failure to approve the bill is that he did not consider the city was receiving the service charged for. He also recommended that the city take steps to fix a price at which lights should be furnished to the patrons of the company, and also that the company be required to fur-nish meters for patrons who desire

The bill was allowed over the mayor's disapproval, for the reason that the lights were ordered and should be paid for. The council, however, was of the opinion that the service should be improved and the mayor's recommendations were referred to the committee on

electric light. In discussing the matter, Mayor Roy-lance stated that he did not expect the disapproval of the claim would be upheld, but he wanted to bring the mat-ter before the council. He believed the city and the citizens were not receiving such light as they were charged for. There were other electric com-panies, said the mayor, from which light could be obtained, if the Electric company did not treat its customers

The committee on judiciary presented a contract with F. C. Kelsey for supervising the erection of the proposed electric power plant. The matter of accepting the contract was referred to the committee on judiciary and the city attorney, who will meet with Mr.

The committee on sewer recommended that the sewer be extended on Fifth West and Third West streets. Report

adopted.

The committee on electric light reported on the petition of the Elks in the matter of electric light for the car-nival in June. The committee recom-mended that such concessions could be granted, but did not favor an appropriation of money to make a great electric display. Mr. M. M. Warner, who was present in behalf of the Elks, stated that the cost of lighting the streets for the four nights the carnival will be in session would be about \$750. This in session would be about \$750. This was the only electric display the Elks expected to make; the expense under which the Elks would be under were great, and they would like some assistance from the city to help in paying for the light. The report was amended so as to recommend an appropriation of \$100, and the report as amended was adopted.

The committee on public grounds and city property recommended that the city watermaster and the street super-visors be given offices in the basement.

Report adopted.

The board of health recommended that a sewer district be made on First West, between Center and First South and on First South, between First and Second West, in order to overcome the objections arising from the seepage water along those streets. The re-port also recommended that garbage boxes be provided by business house and that the city remove the garbage also that gutters along Center street be laid in grade with the street in order to drain water from grocery stores and other places. Report adopted and the matter was referred to the commit-

tees on sewer. Councilman Booth brought up the question of the legality of the appoint-ment of John E. Bott as a member of the city council, and in view of the fact that the attorney general had given an opinion that the appointment was not legal, he moved that the recorder be 'nstructed to request City At-terney Evans to furnish the council with an opinion in the matter. The motion was voted down by a strict party vote, six Democrats voting against

it and the four Republicans for Mr. Booth then gave notice that until the matter of the legality of the pointment was determined he would fect to Mr. Bott taking any part in the proceedings of the council.
