THE CORBETT-JEFF' ARTICLES Full Text of Agreement Entered Into by Fighters.

TWENTY-ROUND CONTEST.

Will Use Regulation Five-Ounce Gloves and May Wear Soft Handages-July or August.

Copies of the fight articles signed by Corbett and Billy Delaney in Baltimore last week read as follows:

This agreement entered into this fifth day of March A. D. 1905, by and between James J. Jeffries and James J. Corbett, whereby they agree to meet in a boxing contest of 20, rounds, according to the Marquis of Queensbury rules, and to use the regulation five-ounce boxing gloves. Should either man desire to use soft bandages on his hands he may do so, the same to be put on in the ring, preceding the contest and in full view d the audience and to the satisfaction f the referee.

The contest to take place in the state f California during the month of July or August, A. D. 1903, under the auspices of the club offering the biggest ourse, no purse offered to be considered unless accompanied by a deposit of \$5.000. Bids to be sent to Harry Corbett of San Francisco, accompaniel by the \$5,000 deposit, and duplicate bids to be sent to Tom O'Rourke of New York City. All blds to be opened at 2 o'clock

p. m. on April 1, 1903. It is also agreed that the club managing the contest shall deposit a certified check covering the entire amount

of the purse offered in the hands of Thomas H. Williams at least 10 days prior to the contest. It is also agreed that each man be

allowed to furnish his own gloves, which shall be placed in the hands of he referee 48 hours prior to the con-

The said James J. Jeffries and James J. Corbett shall deposit the sum of \$2,500 in the hands of ---- as a guarof the intee to fulfill this agreement when a lub offen is accepted.


The Getzes are building contractors and Portner is the owner of an apart-ment house on a addition of which


