

STANLEY KETCHEL BEATS J. O'BRIEN

Philadelphia Practically Out at End of Ten Fast Rounds.

SHOWED GREAT GAMENESS

Knocked Down Three Times in Final Session—Both Men Badly Punished—Good Preliminaries.

National Athletic Club, New York, March 26.—Not since the repeal of the Horner law, which stopped the big fight bouts in this city, has such a fast and furious contest been seen here in the squared circle as that tonight, in which Stanley Ketchel, the middleweight champion, defeated Jack O'Brien of Philadelphia at the National Athletic Club. Many thought O'Brien would do some stalling in this fight, but every one who saw the fight was agreeably surprised, for it was a hot bout from start to finish.

In the final round O'Brien was knocked down three times, and the last time was practically a clean knockout, for the timely clasp of the rope found the Philadelphia man in a helpless state. It was Ketchel's fight for the greater part of the contest, and O'Brien has no excuse to make over the outcome.

Tim Hurst was referee. The men weighed in at noon today, each tipping the scales at 160 pounds.

There were three preliminary bouts, one of which resulted in a knockout. Freddie Dippel of Brooklyn, fighting Andy Parker of New Haven in less than two minutes of the first round.

O'Brien was the first to enter the ring. He wore bandages on both hands. One of his prominent handlers was Anthony Lescot, a Frenchman who had been with Ketchel since he was a boy.

Round 1.—Both men stripped evidently in the last of the preliminary bouts, and Ketchel landed a low left hook, but O'Brien's head was not completely downed. The referee then clinched several times Ketchel forcing O'Brien around the ring. A left hook raised a lump over Ketchel's eye. O'Brien sent in a hard right under the heart and a left hook to the jaw, which stopped Ketchel back a bit, but the Philadelphia man was blowing the worse after the windup.

Round 2.—O'Brien forced the milling but Ketchel broke cleverly. Then Ketchel started to force the milling, but was short on right and left swings. O'Brien sent left and right hooks to the jaw and was faster in land and foot work, but in the middle of the round he began to hold. Ketchel landed a fearful hard right swing on the eye and the same evening they will board the train for Salt Lake.

Round 3.—Ketchel rushed and forced O'Brien to the ropes. The Philadelphia man was holding. Ketchel was calm and deliberate while O'Brien showed signs of nervousness. O'Brien upped with right and left to the face, but there was no force behind the blows. O'Brien missed a left and right for the head and then lunged his opponent.

Round 4.—Ketchel rushed O'Brien to the ropes with body blows and then with a hard left swing opened a gash over O'Brien's right eye. O'Brien tried to get back but Ketchel straightened left and sent three surprisingly fast left hooks to the jaw, knocking Ketchel down. Ketchel fought back like a demon with a left hook to the face and O'Brien showed up. Both men were from Ketchel's side of the ring with two rights to the jaw.

Round 5.—They came to a clinch. Ketchel landed a telling left hook to the jaw. O'Brien jabbed his left twice to the face and the blood started from Ketchel's nose. O'Brien outgeneraled his opponent, fast work and hooked a left to the jaw which stopped Ketchel. He then sent two rights to the face, making Ketchel stagger.

Round 6.—Up to this time Ketchel's famous left shift had not been in use. They again rushed to a clinch and although Ketchel was the more powerful, O'Brien determined. O'Brien sent left and right hooks to the jaw at the bell. Ketchel's round.

Round 7.—Both men were wild when they met, but Ketchel sent in two lefts to the face, and then with a right hand to the stomach. O'Brien went down heavily on the face, but broke around when Ketchel landed a right to the back of the head and left to the jaw, stopping Ketchel. A right uproot followed by a left to the face and two right swings to the jaw turned the tide against Ketchel, and he staggered to his corner.

Round 8.—Both men were slow at the start and swung his right over, staggering Ketchel. O'Brien was too tired to take advantage of Ketchel's distress. At this stage O'Brien's ring generalship and Ketchel's injured leg before the bell rang.

Round 9.—Ketchel swung his left and they clinched. O'Brien kept his left to the face, and then fell down after getting a hard left to the stomach. Ketchel forced the pace with right and left to the stomach and O'Brien showed distress.

Round 10.—Ketchel was the quicker to begin and sent two lefts to the face, which forced O'Brien to clinch. O'Brien tried right and left and showed Ketchel up a bit. Ketchel sent O'Brien to the floor from second, and he went down again from a two right smashes on the jaw. A second and right swing sent O'Brien down a third time from a knockout. The bell saved him from a knockout.

GOTCH BEATS ITALIAN.

SCHATZ FALLS AND TEAM FINISHES SECOND.

DAYTONA RACES CLOSE.
Twilight, March 26.—On the fourth and last day of the season, the Daytona Beach tournament, the "Fast 50," driven by Ray De Palma, had a walkover victory over the "Fast 100." The same car won the mile invitation race. De Palma handily won from scratch with his time from the 5-mile handicap race in 2:14.4.

Ray De Palma made the best time, 1:44.3, for a bicycle race in a mile by a motorcycle.

In the attempt to beat Murphy's old record of 2:22 seconds for a mile, Long Island behind a locomotive, Jimmy L. Collier of Lynn, Mass., rode a mile on a bicycle in 2:24 seconds behind the Fast 50.

The 50-mile motorcycle event was won by W. C. Chappard of New York, who won the 50-mile race in 2:15 minutes after a new-made race of 20 miles in 1:15 minutes in 21 seconds.

JACK POWELL WINS.
San Francisco, March 26.—Jack Powell of San Francisco was given the decision over Stanley Rasmus of Milwaukee at the end of a 10-round bout in Dramland tonight. The decision was not well received by the crowd, as it was thought that the fight should have been declared a draw.

Revered through persistent left-hand jabbing, secured a lead in the first 10 rounds, but after that slowed up considerably. Rasmus finished strong, and was fighting with great determination when the bout ended. The betting was even.

DANIELS BREAKS RECORD.
Pittsburgh, March 26.—C. M. Daniels of New York broke the world record for a 20-yard swim at the East Liberty Aquatic club tonight in a national championship event under the auspices of the American Athletic union.

Daniel's record was 2:25.3, three seconds less than the world record, held for the last three years by Kieran of Australia.

COWARDLY FOUL.
Sacramento, Cal., March 26.—Ed Williams of Stockton lost to Frank Mantell of Rhode Island in the thirteenth round tonight, the decision being given to the eastern boy by Referee Levenson on a foul. As Mantell started for his corner with his right arm raised, he was fouled by Williams, followed him and knocked him down with a right swing. Referee Levenson declared it a deliberate foul.

CHAMPIONSHIP SCHEDULE.
New York, March 26.—The executive committee of the United States Lawn Tennis association met tonight at the Waldorf-Astoria and arranged the schedule of championship and other tournaments. It is reported that the national championship is scheduled for the end of the season, R. L. beginning Tuesday, Aug. 17.

Matters pertaining to the matches for the Davis international cup were discussed, but nothing definite in regard to the American team will be done until the season opens.

BEEBE A BALL TOSSEY.
Cashier C. C. Beebe of the Zion's Savings Bank & Trust company will be second base on one of the four baseball teams to be organized from the local teams. Mr. Beebe has a record as a pitcher of 36 years in 314 games, while his height and length of arm will make it difficult for a ball to get by him. Mr. Beebe can lead three feet into the air after a hot liner, or a wild throw. He is considered a most valuable asset in the banking baseball resources.

ABE ATTELL WINS.
Dayton, O., March 26.—Abe Attell, the featherweight champion of the world, knocked out Frank White of Chicago in the eighth round of what was to have been a 10-round bout tonight. The fight was not unexpected, as the Californian had his antagonist groggy practically throughout the whole night.

Just after White went down from a hard blow on the point of the jaw, James J. Corbett, who has been playing at a local theatre, was introduced. He and Attell did a little fancy shadow boxing to the delight of the spectators. Corbett thanked the crowd for its welcome, and mentioned the challenge he had recently made to Jack Johnson.

Attell started after White in the first round and drew blood from his nose and mouth. He rushed him to the ropes and had him swinging wildly.

The second round found White rans and weak. He managed to land just one hard blow on Attell's face at the close of the third round. Attell came up smiling and chewing gum. He appeared exceptionally cool.

In the fourth the Californian staggered White by crashing body blows and raining lefts and rights to White's face. He landed one of White's eyes and battered his mouth.

In the fifth and sixth White seemed to get back his nerve, and then the crowd cheered as he received some of the champion's hard blows.

Attell started in the seventh to finish the Chicagoan and nearly accomplished it. He landed six blows to his opponent's nose and had him crawling the ring like a lost man.

The end came during the eighth, Attell using his right to the jaw with walling force. White, who has 16 knockouts to his credit, was unconscious for several minutes.

ON THE RACE TRACK.
Royal Tourist Disqualified and G. Burns Suspended at Emeryville.

At Oakland.
Oakland, Cal., March 26.—As a result of an aggravated case of rough riding in the fourth race at Emeryville today, the Royal Tourist was disqualified and G. Burns suspended. Only four horses went to the post, with Light Wool an odds on favorite.

The Royal Tourist was piloted by Charles Ellison and his connections. Before half a mile had been covered Burns, on Royal Tourist, forced Palo Alto in toward the rail, causing Light Wool to stumble. In the stretch the favorite was again interfered with, and the Ellison horse beat him in a drive. When the riders were called on to the stand it developed that Burns called to Palo Alto to interfere with Light Wool.
