

MOTIVE OF KILLING STANFORD WHITE

District Attorney's Office is Doing
All it Can to Discover
What it Was.

STAGE WOMEN BROUGHT IN.

The Broadway Theatrical District Has
Been Flooded With Sub-
poenas.

New York, July 9.—The investigation of the district attorney's office to discover the motive for the killing of Stanford White by Harry K. Thaw is bringing to the office of the prosecutor many young women of the stage. The Broadway theatrical district has been flooded with subpoenas. Many chorus girls have left the city and others remain at their homes to avoid the subpoena servers. Two young women whom the district attorney's office have been particularly eager to interview are Miss Paula Desmond and Miss Gertrude Grant. It is alleged that these young women were followed and annoyed by detectives who had been employed to watch White.

Paula Desmond, whose real name is Pauline Kellerman, is now at her home in Kingston, N. Y., and a representative of the district attorney's office has gone there to see her. Miss Grant has been abroad for some time but returned last Saturday. Detectives were watching all the steamships, but she slipped ashore unseen and her whereabouts now is not known.

Both Miss Grant and Miss Desmond are known to have been friends of Stanford White. The activity of the district attorney's office in running down all clues in the theatrical district is largely due to the story told by Mrs. Thaw, who said that her husband had been followed by a detective.

Mrs. Thaw is reported to have answered: "Stop taking up my past, Harry. That brute over there is responsible. Go to him about it."

"I will," said Thaw. "I'll get him yet."

Mrs. LeGrande Mink, the mother of Edna McClure, was with her daughter

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at the district attorney's office yesterday. In speaking of the Thaw case today he said:

"Harry Thaw's hate for Stanford White was like that of a maniac. He seemed possessed of a consuming horror of White. It was plainly a mania with him."

The district attorney's office also is searching for William Sturgis, a close friend of Harry K. Thaw, who has disappeared since the tragedy. It is reported that Sturgis had heard Thaw make threats against Stanford White.

A witness whose testimony may be of considerable importance in connection with the Thaw-White case was found today in the person of Warren Hammond, who at one time was employed by Thaw as a valet. Until today it had been supposed that when William Bedford, Thaw's regular valet, died the testimony of the only person who had ever occupied the position of a body servant to the young man had been irrevocably lost. He, however, had been substituted for Bedford during three months when the latter was ill about three years ago. It is expected that Hammond will be examined at the district attorney's office tomorrow.

Among the persons questioned by Asst. Dist. Atty. Garvin today was Charles Harnett, who was employed by Stanford White as a secretary. It is understood that Mr. Harnett's testimony tended to contradict the current reports of much that was discredited in Mr. White's private life.

A Mr. Schwartz, who lives in West Thirty-second street, and who is an intimate friend of the Thaws, will be questioned by Mr. Garvin tomorrow. It is said that shortly after Harry Thaw and Miss Nesbit were married Thaw threatened, in the presence of Mrs. Schwartz, to shoot Stanford White and it is to ascertain if this threat was actually made that Mr. Garvin interrogated Mrs. Schwartz.

STILL HUNTING WITNESSES.

New York, July 10.—While Harry K. Thaw's counsel are collecting evidence with a view to proving that he was insane at the time he killed Stanford White, Asst. Dist. Atty. Francis P. Garvin continues to seek witnesses who are reported to have heard Thaw threaten the man who is supposed to have been his rival in the affections of Evelyn Nesbit before she became Mrs. Thaw.

The theory of the prosecution is that Thaw had no motive for the shooting except hatred and jealousy dating from the time Evelyn Nesbit consulted lawyers and made a smart statement reflecting upon the man she soon afterwards married.

Although the defense has adopted a policy of silence, Terrence J. McManus, one of Thaw's lawyers, said yesterday that if any documents purporting to be an affidavit made by Mrs. Thaw was introduced, it would be proved a forgery.

"Then you expect to bring handwriting experts into the case?" was suggested.

"None will be necessary," returned Mr. McManus. "We can show that Mrs. Thaw never signed any paper and that whatever she has been prepared she was not cognizant of its contents and she did not subscribe to it."

Mr. McManus refused to discuss the number of alienists who will be called into the case to assist Dr. Allen McLane Hamilton, who has had several long conferences with the prisoner. Dr. Carlos MacDonald, one of the experts for the prosecution, had a talk

with Mr. Garvin yesterday. Dr. MacDonald and several other alienists tried to examine Thaw on the day after he was indicted and the then refused positively to answer any questions put to him, despite the advice of William M. K. Olcott, who was present in his interests.

Mr. Olcott was not in his office yesterday and it was said he was not expected during the day. He went to Philadelphia on Saturday and it was reported to obtain information about Miss Harriett Thaw, a cousin of the prisoner, who has been confined in the Friends' asylum for the insane, in Frankfurt, for the last two years. An effort will be made, it is believed, to show that Thaw suffers from hereditary taint and officials of the Friends' asylum may be called as witnesses in his behalf. Mr. Olcott's associates denied knowledge of his whereabouts, but said he expected to visit several places in search of witnesses.

DREYFUS CASE.

Expected Decision of Rennes Court-Martial Will be Annulled.

Paris, July 9.—The supreme court held a lengthy secret session today and adjourned without announcing its decision in the Dreyfus case. It is generally expected that the decision of the Rennes court-martial will be annulled, but the court is understood to be divided upon the question of quashing the verdict entirely or ordering a new trial. The Dreyfus case is re-awakening intense bitterness and has already resulted in one duel. Gen. Gonse, former assistant chief of the general staff, who is opposed to Dreyfus's claims, challenged Col. Piquart, former head of the intelligence department of the French army who is a strong supporter of Dreyfus, at a hostile meeting. An encounter with pistols at 25 paces was arranged for today with the result that the general fired and missed his adversary. The colonel refused to fire.

PRIEST FINED FOR INTIMIDATING VOTER.

Leipzig, Germany, July 9.—The Imperial supreme court today confirmed the decision of the lower court in fining Father Woerner, a Catholic priest of Constantine, grand duchy of Baden, \$20 for threatening a voter with denial of the sacrament if he did not vote for the Center party candidate for the Reichstag.

PRESIDENTIAL APPOINTMENTS.

Oyster Bay, July 9.—President Roosevelt today appointed Charles Earle as solicitor for the department of commerce and labor to succeed Edwin W. Simmons, recently appointed United States district attorney in Chicago. Charles Earle was at one time an employee of the bureau of corporations and is now an assistant attorney in the department of justice. He was also announced that Richard K. Campbell, formerly solicitor of the bureau of immigration of the department of commerce and labor had been made chief of the new bureau of naturalization in that department.

WAGE SCALE SIGNED.

Pittsburg, July 9.—Officials of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel & Tin Workers of America announced today that practically all the independent tin and sheet plate companies of the country have signed the wage scale for the ensuing year. This, it is said, insures work being started at once in all of the independent plants and steady employment for the year owing to the large number of orders already booked.

MEMORIAL WINDOWS.

Canton, O., July 9.—Mrs. William McKinley has presented to the First Methodist Episcopal church of Canton 9 memorial art glass windows in honor of the late president. The windows, which cost several thousand dollars, will be of the finest glass procurable. The designs for them were made by one of the largest art glass firms in the east, and are at present

in the hands of the trustees of the church. The church at present has no memorial of McKinley except a small brass tablet marking the McKinley pew.

STEERAGE RATE WAR.

Rate From Bremen to New York Reduced Two and a Half.

Bremen, July 9.—The North German Lloyd Steamship company today reduced the steerage rate to New York \$2.50.

Hamburg, July 9.—The reduction in emigrant passage rates announced by the North German Lloyd Steamship company is that of company's answer to the Hamburg-American line's cut of the same amount last week, which is its second recent reduction. The situation begins to look extremely like a rate war between the Hamburg-American and North German Lloyd lines in the emigrant business.

It is explained in the Hamburg newspapers that the Hamburg-American company's reduction was designed to give Hamburg its proper share of the emigrant business which latterly has been declining, the emigrants departing from this port in June numbering only 5,611 as compared with 12,229 in May. Both Austria and Russia sent in June less than half the number of emigrants that departed from those countries in May.

OYSTER BAY LIBRARY.

President Presents it With Bible Bound In Four Volumes.

Oyster Bay, July 9.—President Roosevelt today sent to the Oyster Bay library four handsomely bound volumes, being the Old and New Testaments, illustrated by James Tissot. The two volumes of the Old Testament contain 26 illustrations, and the two of the New Testament 26 illustrations. Ever since the president laid the cornerstone of this library he has sent a contribution of books.

FIRE IN MADRID, IOWA.

Madrid, Ia., July 9.—Fire completely destroyed the Armour elevator here with a loss of \$100,000. The fire started from a spark from the elevator's own engine and 250,000 bushels of grain were burned.

PEASANTS INDICTED.

Nizni Novgorod, July 4.—For participation in agrarian disorders in this province 446 peasants have been indicted. Among the accused is a member of the lower house of parliament named Filatoff.
