

THE B. Y. EXAMINATION AND CONCERT.

Editors Deseret News:

Friday, April 2nd, 1880, witnessed the close of the thus far most numerously attended term of this institution.

At 9 a.m. the public examination commenced. Music furnished by the academic choir, led by the musical department teacher. As representatives of the board were present—President Smoot, Bishop L. E. Harrington, Mr. W. H. Dusenberry and Mrs. M. J. Coray.

As usual, the tables presented a fine display of class specimens, examination papers and ladies' work, which were distributed for inspection between the exercises by the managing committee.

The Principal first read his report to the Board. The general statistics for past term are as follows:

By this it will be seen that the attendance has exceeded that of any other term by 13. An extract from another chapter of the report shows a list of 70 different classes, and 333 weekly recitations. The principal, regular teachers and normal students assisting practically number in all 27 different teachers officiating daily. Statistics of Theological department showed following table: 1 seventy, 20 elders, 11 priests, 14 teachers, 51 deacons, 175 lay members; 18 not baptized; 5 under age; 18 non members; total 313. The students are tabulated according to their places of residence as follows: Provo 192, Lehi 6, Pleasant Grove 10, American Fork 7, Alpine 5, Cedar Valley 4, Springville 10, Spanish Fork 2, Payson 4, Goshen 5, Salt Lake County 9, Wasatch County 6, Tooele County 9, Juab County 12, Sanpete County 4, Millard County 9, Beaver County 6, Kane County 3, Washington County 7, Iron County 2, Idaho Territory 1; total 313.

Those students residing outside of Provo are distributed in 49 boarding places. A visiting committee of 20 has been organized, the members of which visit the boarding houses at specified times, ascertaining the situation and domestic affairs of the students.

Following the reading of the report came addresses by students in behalf of the various departments and organizations of the Academy.

President Smoot, Mrs. M. J. Coray, Bishop Harrington and Mr. W. H. Dusenberry, in turn addressed the assembly, eulogizing the labors of the past term and encouraging all for the labors of future times.

Academy adjourned session until April 12, 1880.

The members of the Poly-sophical Society have prepared a concert, which was first presented Friday evening, April 2d, and underwent a repetition by special request Saturday evening. The proceeds of this movement are designed to benefit the musical department by procuring therefor an instrument.

Throwing himself across the shaft he let go of the rope, and with wonderful dexterity

and good luck managed to lodge with his back against the other. Thus braced he managed to remain until the rope, which had reached the mouth of the shaft empty, was sent down to him, and he was rescued from his perilous position.—Leadville Democrat.
