Logan, Cache Co., Aug. 12.—The county commissioners met yesterday to consider a complaint received from State Game Warden Sharp against the Coche and warden Sharp against the Cache county warden, David Crook-ston, in which the state official claimed that Crookston had been lax and incompetent in attending to his duties as fish and game warden, and recommending the appointment of Albert J Merrill, of Smithfield, as his successor Pursuant to citation, Crookston ap-peared before the board and stated his case. He denied having been lax in his duties, claiming that owing to the small salary given him, \$29 per month, he was able only to devote about half his time to wardenship duties, which he had conscientiously done. The commissioners attempted to get specific charges from Sharp by tele-phone, but could not locate him. Further consideration of the matter was thereupon deferred until Monday next.
