At Farmington, Davis County, Utah, July 14, 1879, of paralysis, Elder SAMUEL COTTELL.

Brother Cottrell was born May 7, 1816, at Warrington, Lancashire, England; joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in 1839; emigrated on the ship *Hanover*, from Liverpool, March 15th, 1842; landed in New Orleans the May following. He came up the river to Warsaw, where he resided till the death of the Prophet Joseph,

at which time he, in company with others, was taken by a mob and chained up in a log house in Warsaw. He then moved to Nauvoo, where he remained till he was sent to St. Louis to assist in presiding over one of the wards of that place. In the Spring of 1849 he moved to Macedonia Camp, Potawatimie County, where he remained till 1852; in that year he crossed the Plains and came to Utah; two years he resided in the 19th Ward, Salt Lake City; he then settled in Farmington where he has resided till his death.

Bro. Cottrell was a member of the 27th Quorum of Seventies. He was well known by a large circle of friends as a man of excellent character, temperate in his habits, industrious and upright in his dealings, and straightforward in his manner. He was a man whose word was his bond. Over twenty years he was the leader of the Farmington Choir. He labored in the cause of Zion; was firm and faithful, and died in full fellowship, and in the hope of a glorious resurrection.

Last winter he was stricken with paralysis, since then he has gradually declined. He was patient in his sufferings, calmly contemplating the change that he knew would soon come.

The funeral services took place at the meeting house on the 16th inst. Remarks were made by Bishop Hess, Job Wellin and John Edlison, all bearing testimony to his long life of usefulness. At his services and the grave, his choir sang pieces that he had selected for the occasion. Peace to his ashes, and may those he left behind emulate his virtues.
