Washington, March 29 .- The question as to how Gen. Funston will be re-warded for his services in capturing the head and front of the Philippine insur-rection continues to be a topic of dis-cussion in all official circles. In view of Gen. MacArthur's specific recommendation, indorsed by Gen. Wheaton, that Gen. Funston be appointed a brigadier-general in the regular army, there seems to be no doubt in well-informed quarters that the President will meet promptly the popular demand in this

matter, and appoint Gen, Funston to one of the existing vacancies in the list them infury because they declined to one of the existing vacancies in the list of brigadier-generals. Philadelphia, March 30 .- The Norwegian steamer Krim, the schooner Florence and the British bark Severn have practically been given up as lost, The crews of these vessels aggregate fifty-four men and all are believed to have been drowned.
