

JAPAN WOULD FIGHT RUSSIA.

Will Never Consent to a Russian Manchuria.

PORT ARTHUR IS NO MENACE

Great Territorial Army on Chinese Soil Must be Withdrawn Beyond the Frontier.

Victoria, B. C., March 11.—Prince Renome, president of the Japanese house of peers, recently gave the Japanese Advertiser an interview on the Manchurian question. As head of the National Union league, and founder of the Toyo, edited weekly under the style of the Nippon Shu-Ho, he has taken a prominent part in all protests against Russia's territorial plans on Chinese soil.

"Japan will never consent to a Russian Manchuria," said the prince, "on this point the government is absolutely determined. Nor should we hesitate to take recourse to armed remonstrance were Russia to continue in her recent semi-defiant attitude. We have sympathy of both the United States and Great Britain in this matter, and know what we are doing."

"Japan has no objection whatever to Russia's leaving Port Arthur. It would not in any way menace our interests. As for the trans-Manchurian railway, we regard its construction with lively satisfaction, in that it will unquestionably serve to open new fields for foreign industrial and commercial undertakings. But Russia would have to maintain troops along the railway in order to keep it from attack on the part of the natives."

"Would Japan object to Russian troops in Manchuria for this purpose?" "Not at all where the presence of such troops is necessary, as in the case with the railroad, Japan would never object to their presence. But Russia's great territorial army on Chinese soil must be withdrawn beyond the frontier and that without further loss of time."

"The province must be kept entirely under Chinese control, not only because of its mineral and other wealth, but also as being the birthplace of the present Chinese dynasty. Continued occupation of Manchuria by any foreign power whatever would mean the downfall of the present dynasty and subsequent revolution and anarchy. I am convinced that the tenure of Manchuria as a Chinese state is positively necessary to the maintenance and continuance of the present Chinese government."

"What is thought in Japan of the attitude taken by the United States in this connection?" "It is viewed with gratitude and respect. The United States has from the past, insisted on the open door policy for all nations, and a Russian Manchuria would be directly opposed to such a policy. We have implicit confidence in the bonafides of America in this matter as in others, and are persuaded that the United States will look up in the stand we have taken with the United States, as well as the absolutely unselfish and strictly just power. We have had frequent proofs of the correctness of this view."

AMERICAN INFLUENCE IN CHINA

Has Been Extended to Secure Early Withdrawal of Troops from Tien Tsin.

Washington, March 12.—It is true as reported from Peking that the influence of the American government has been extended to secure the early withdrawal of troops from Tien Tsin. Having withdrawn our troops, our government can do nothing further in that direction than to use moral suasion with the other powers. It is stated here that this has been effective to the extent that everyone of the powers has assented to the proposition to withdraw the troops. Even Germany, which is now reported as halting. While there have been no recent exchanges on the subject a few weeks ago the German government was sounded and readily responded that it intended to withdraw its troops as soon as they had secured what is regarded as necessary guarantees and had been satisfied that the situation was not likely to be a source of danger to the foreign residents in Tien Tsin. It is understood here therefore that the question is simply one of judgment as to the time of withdrawal.

Terlinden Will be Extradited.

Chicago, March 12.—As the result of an order by Judge Kohlsaat, denying further hearings to Gerolamo Terlinden, the defendant, who has been fighting extradition proceedings for several months, has been turned over to German Consul Wever by United States Marshal Ames. Terlinden will be taken to Berlin for trial on a charge of defrauding several banks in Prussia out of \$250,000.

Gov. Hunt Visiting Coast Towns.

San Juan, P. R., March 12.—Gov. Hunt, the heads of departments and the wives of these officials, Col. Burton, the chief army officer of Porto Rico, and others, totaling about 15 persons, are visiting coast towns on the steamer San Juan. The tour will last five days. When the party arrived at Ponce enthusiastic crowds lined the two miles of road from the port to the city and the visitors were royally received. The governor made a speech from the balcony of the city hall, and reviewed two companies of the Eleventh regiment and 2,000 school children. There was a banquet and a ball at the Casino in the evening. This was the governor's first visit to Ponce.

Clerk's Fraudulent Operations.

New York, March 12.—A dispatch from Rosario, Argentina, says Rosario, a clerk employed by the firm of Castagnio & Co. has obtained by fraud, \$15,000 from the New York firm of Fleming, Thedy & Co., by a letter, according to the Buenos Ayres correspondent of the Herald. Rossi, it is alleged, told Castagnio to sign a letter authorizing the latter firm to give Rossi any money that he would require during his stay in the United States. The letter was mixed with a lot of other papers and Rossi, who is a native of the United States, signed it without knowing its contents. Rossi resigned his position, went to New York and obtained \$15,000 from the New York firm of Fleming, Thedy & Co. by the explosion.

Stole Gov. Hogg's Watch.

New York, March 12.—Jose Diaz Alvaraz, a young Mexican, has pleaded guilty to stealing the \$30 gold watch of former Gov. Hogg of Texas, on Oct. 21, in the Waldorf Astoria. Counsel for Alvaraz said the defendant came from Mexico with some money and stayed at the Waldorf. He was in the elevator one day with Gov. Hogg and took his watch. Alvaraz was sentenced to the Elmira reformatory.

Father Charles, Dead.

New York, March 12.—Brother Charles, president of Manhattan college, and one of the best known educators in the Catholic church, died at the institution of which he was the head. He went a week ago last Sunday morning to attend services in St. Patrick's cathedral, where he contracted a severe cold, which developed into pneumonia. Brother Charles was born in Paterson, N. J., 47 years ago. He was chosen president of the college two years ago.

To Take Up Batson's Case.

Lake Charles, La., March 12.—The grand jury here will assemble next Monday to take up the case of Edward Batson, accused of the murder of the six members of the Earl family at Walden. Batson fled to New Orleans to identify Batson as the man who attempted to sell Earl's mules failed to do so.

Illinois Anti-Trust Law.

Springfield, Ill., March 12.—According to the opinion of Atty. Gen. Hamlin and other officials, the decision handed down by the United States Supreme court in the case of the Standard Oil Co. is not nearly so significant as some persons believe. The law passed upon by that tribunal is not, as commonly supposed, the one providing for an annual report by the corporations of the state to the secretary of state, with an accompanying affidavit to the effect that the corporation has not entered into any sort of a trust. The law passed upon is one making the act of entering into such combination a misdemeanor and providing a penalty for such action.

Iowa's Railroad Taxing Bill.

Des Moines, Iowa, March 12.—By a vote of 33 to 9 the senate has passed the measure authorizing a bill for the taxation of railroad property on a basis of stocks and bonds, net and gross earnings, and physical condition. The measure requires the publication of the records of the executive council in making the assessment and its reasons for

Recent Murders Near Beaumont.

Beaumont, Tex., March 12.—It is the theory of the police that an organized band of negro women and white men are responsible for the recent murders after robberies here and there. It is making arrests on that theory. He now has a woman in the "sweet box" whom he believes to be the ring leader and believes that she will shortly confess.

"Amen Corners" to be Incorporated.

New York, March 12.—Frequenters of the "Amen Corner" at the Fifth Avenue hotel have prepared papers of incorporation which will be filed with the secretary of state. The object of the incorporation is stated to be social enjoyment of the members. The "Amen Corner" has been popular for many years with state and city Republican politicians. Plans are now being made for the annual dinner on April 4, when Senator Thomas C. Platt will be the guest of honor.

A Dry Goods Swindler Arraigned.

New York, March 12.—Simultaneously with the seizure at Grand Forks, N. D., on an attachment of \$10,000 worth of silks and dry goods, on Tuesday, Louis Cohen was brought into the Central street police court, where he was arraigned on the charge of grand larceny before Magistrate Brann, Cohen, who formerly was a member of the clothing firm of Kanter and Cohen, at

CHARGES AGAINST JAMES CHIPMAN.

Prominent Banker Accused Severely by Omaha Firm.

SUED FOR SUM OF \$75,000.

Harris & Co. Allege That Chipman Conspired With Bradshaw Bros. Of Lehi to Defraud Them.

Harris & Company of Omaha have filed a suit for \$75,000 against James Chipman, president of the Utah National bank, also of the Bank of American Fork, and former treasurer of the state of Utah. This suit involving such a large sum is accompanied with strong allegations. The allegations also rest on John P. and Richard W. Bradshaw, members of the bankrupt firm of Bradshaw Bros. of Lehi.

Mr. Chipman is charged with having entered into a conspiracy with the Bradshaw Bros. to conspire with the Bradshaw firm to defraud the Omaha firm in that he secured payment on his private debts with money that the Harris firm of \$12,732 in the hands of American Fork, for the purpose of purchasing sheep. The bill of complaint is voluminous, covering 40 type-written pages of foolscap. It was drawn up in Omaha and filed here by Attorney A. L. Hoppaugh, local representative of Harris & Co.

The complainants state in the first count that they had confidence in Chipman because of the public office he held and his standing in the business world, and therefore when he recommended sheep, they bought them. They state that the Bradshaw firm, which was a business ability and of strict integrity, when the latter applied for the position of representing them as purchasers of sheep, they were induced to install them as the agents of the firm.

They now allege that when Chipman so recommended them he falsely and fraudulently concealed their true condition, the fact being that they were insolvent and indebted in a large sum to Chipman, having entirely exhausted their credit at his banks, having over \$100,000 in the hands of American Fork, and about \$100,000 indebtedness in unpaid promissory notes. It is further charged that Chipman was well aware of their insolvency and was acting as their advisor and counselor, but for fraudulent purposes concealed the confidential relations between himself and the Bradshaw Bros.

The complaint goes on to state that as a result of Chipman's high recommendations, Harris & Co. entered into a contract with Bradshaw Bros. to buy sheep and cattle for the firm, for which the former were to receive, as compensation, all over 10 per cent profit on the money invested. Harris & Co. agreed to honor all eight drafts drawn by the Bradshaw Bros. on them up to \$30,000, in order that the carrying on of the business should not be impeded for the lack of ready funds.

It is affirmed in the complaint, that between June 28, 1899, and May 1, 1900, Harris & Co. under the terms of their contract, paid over to Bradshaw Bros. not less than \$134,920. A number of drafts, collected through the Bank of American Fork, were honored by Harris & Co., the exact sum not being known, but the whole approximating \$75,000. The allegation is then made that notwithstanding the stipulation in the contract that the money advanced was only to be used in the purchase of livestock, "said Chipman fraudulently and corruptly combined and conspired with said Bradshaw Bros. to defraud your orator, and converted, misappropriated, and misapplied the money received by him through the drafts made by Bradshaw Bros. upon your orator, and used a large amount of said funds in the banking business of the Bank of American Fork."

Chipman is charged with having deducted sums amounting to \$15,000, personal indebtedness due him by Bradshaw Bros. from money received by him from the Omaha firm. Then he entered upon his books credits to the account of Bradshaw Bros. for the balance.

The complainant believed that the money was being used for the purchase of stock and, in fact, was so used, but it was fraudulently being used at any time to recover any portion of that amount from the Bradshaw Bros. who are insolvent and in the bankrupt state. The prayer is then made that Chipman be required to make a full disclosure and accounting.

In the second count the charge is made that Chipman knew well that the Bradshaw Bros. were misappropriating and diverting the funds sent them by Harris & Co. And yet he allowed them to draw checks for personal purposes and settle their private debts due him with these funds. The allegation puts the amount of indebtedness discharged in this manner at \$15,000, but the total of the sums misapplied and misappropriated exceeds \$35,000.

It is alleged that on Dec. 28, 1899, Chipman induced Bradshaw Bros. to execute to him a mortgage, purporting to secure a personal indebtedness of \$11,467.72, mortgaging 634 head of cattle that belonged to Harris & Co., having been purchased with money belonging to that firm. Subsequently, it is alleged, Chipman permitted the Bradshaw Bros. to sell the cattle, on which they realized \$5,890, and applied that sum on personal indebtedness.

Another charge is that on Feb. 9, 1900, Chipman permitted J. F. Bradshaw, a member of the firm, to withdraw from the Harris & Co. funds the sum of \$1,000, and convert it to personal uses. An amount approximating \$20,000, it is charged, went the same way, being used by the Bradshaw Bros. for domestic or household expenses.

In conclusion Harris & Co. prays that James Chipman be decreed and adjudged to account for and pay over \$75,000, for money received, converted, misused and misappropriated, as set forth. A writ of subpoena has been served on Mr. Chipman.
