AFFAIRS OF WEBER COUNTY

Business in City Council—Ex-Mayor Boyle Suing for Back Pay.

Suit Filed—District Court Notes—Jailbird Caught—Licensed to Wed.

The board of county commissioners met in regular session and disposed of the following business:

The committee on tax matters reported that a communication had been received from J. S. Carman stating that he would issue a C. W. Newton quit claim deed for certain real estate sold to him by mistake in 1892, by Albert Allen, tax collector, on payment of the sum of \$24, also recommended that warrants be drawn in favor of O. J. Stillman for \$50 for certain property sold erroneously in 1891. The recommendations of the committee were unanimously adopted.

A petition signed by taxpayers praying that W. G. Childs be appointed justice of the peace of the First precinct, Ogden, was received and after due consideration Mr. Childs was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by resignation of Joseph Hall.

David Moore presented his resignation as constable of the Second Ward, and recommended the appointment of R. F. Shepherd to fill the vacancy. The resignation was accepted, and the office declared vacant, and Mr. Shepherd was appointed to fill the vacancy.

County Attorney Halverson made a report of the business of his office since last meeting.

John W. Gibson, county assessor, reported that he had made assessment rolls for 1900 had not yet reached him, although the same should have been delivered to him on Jan. 1st.

CORONER'S INVESTIGATION CONCLUDED.

The coroner's jury investigating the killing of Frank Raddon resumed its inquiry this evening. Engineer Carter was too ill to attend. Fireman Frank Hopkirk was present and testified that Mr. Raddon was about 150 feet from the crossing when he first saw him approaching it, and the engine was about 200 yards from it, and that the usual warning by the bell and whistle was given; that the engine was running at the rate of about 35 miles an hour. He admitted that no effort was made to stop the engine until after the killing occurred.

The jurors rendered a verdict which is substantially as follows: "That the said James H. Raddon came to his death on February 19, 1899, when he was struck by a Denver and Rio Grande Western Railway company's engine on one of the public highway crossings of Davis county. Said public highway being about two quarters of a mile north of the said R. G. W. Ry. Co.'s station at Kayville, Davis county, Utah, and further do say that the employees in charge of said engine of said railway company were guilty of gross negligence in not giving proper warning before coming to said public highway crossing as provided by law."

Their mode of weaving is quite unique and they weave the complicated patterns with great skill and rapidity.
