FALSE RUMORS CORRECTED.

We have already stated in emphatic terms that the rumors about the effect that there is a "dead" whereby Republicans in this city and county are to vote the Democratic ticket, as that Democrats are to vote the Republican ticket, are entirely untrue, as far as our knowledge is concerned. Also that the Church authorities have given no cause for alarm, and have used no influence in favor of any such "dead" or "deadlock" or postponing any election, nor shall we or what ticket he shall support. This has been in reference to reports as to this city and county.

As there are similar rumors in circulation concerning Church influence in other counties, we desire the remarks made concerning this city and county to apply to every part of the Territory. The statement, by whomsoever made, that the Church or its authorities are using any influence whatever to direct the people as to political preference, or as to which candidate they shall support, or what party they shall join, is entirely untrue and should be denied whenever circulated.

We again advise our friends who have joined a political party or pledged themselves to vote for any particular ticket, to be true to their party fully. And we urge upon all voting citizens who have not joined any political party to go to the polls on Monday without exception and without fail, and vote for the ticket which best suits their individual judgment.

Let every citizen do his duty to his country and the community to which he belongs, and that includes the use of the elective franchise for the support of good and honest and popular government.

TO THOSE WHO ATTEST THE TAKENANCE.

We desire to call attention to a matter that concerns attendants at the Sunday services in the Tabernacle in this city. Rev. J. J. Daynes, before the opening of the Tabernacle, performed a voluntary on the organ. It is a most accomplished instrument and he is an accomplished and artistic musician. His manipulation of the grand organ has received the deserved encomiums of musical tourists from all parts of the world.

But this is not sufficient reverence, in our opinion, shown by the people here in the Tabernacle and printing houses of the Saints.

The custom of offering a silent prayer at taking one's seat, when it is silence and it is a meaningful or instructive time, is a very proper one, and might be followed with profit by the people of Utah. At any rate they should observe decent and reverent silence, at least while the services are proceeding and while most of a high order is being performed for their benefit.

More general devotion and quietness in our Tabernacle meetings would be suitable to the place and the occasion both before and during the services, and the more sobering public would be very glad of the opportunity of listening to the voluntary performed by Brother Daynes, as well as all the splendid music, vocal and instrumental, which seems so interesting a part of our public services. Do not forget this gentle hint.
