NORTH OGDEN.

WARREN-MORRIS NUPRIALS.

IN JUDGE GREENWOOD'S COURT.

Lars C. Peterson Awarded \$5,000 in Suit Against Bullion-Beck.

Nephi, Juab Co., Nov. 25.—For the past nine days Judge Greenwood and a jury have been engaged in the trial of the case of Lars C. Peterson against the Bullion-Beck and Thompson Mining company. The plaintiff had leased a block of ground in the Bullion Beck mine, and while he was working the same and extracting ore he claims that the company leased to one John Malvey another block of ground immediately above plaintiff's block; and that the company permitted Malvey to work his said block of ground in such a manner as to cause the ground above the plaintiff to cave down on his ore bodies, and cover them up and thus prevent the plaintiff's pursuing his claim. The plaintiff sued for \$15,000 damages, and the jury after being out all night returned this morning with a verdict of \$5,000 for the plaintiff.

Nephi, Nov. 24.—The case of Leonard DeLong against the Eagle & Blue Bell Mining company, the trial of which was taken up yesterday morning before Judge Clegg and a jury, resulted in the court granting a non-suit after the submission of the plaintiff's testimony. The plaintiff sued as heir for \$20,000 damages for the killing of his son, Emory DeLong, in defendant's mine. The deceased, a boy of 17 years, was going down a skip of the Eagle & Blue Bell mine, to the shaft, and as he came up his head struck against a beam across the shaft and he was instantly killed.

HENEFER.

Teamster Has Narrow Escape From Shocking Death on the Rail.

Henefer, Summit Co., Nov. 21.—Last week a team loaded with lumber was caught while crossing the quarry railway crossing by a backing train. The hind wheels of the wagon were derailed and the load scattered, the driver and team were thrown, and the driver was killed. Mrs. Jane Cousins Birkbeck Lays Down Life's Care at 83.

Cedar City, Iron Co., Nov. 22.—Impressive funeral services were held in the tabernacle on the 17th inst., over the mortal remains of Mrs. Jane Birkbeck, who departed this life on the 15th inst., after 14 days' illness. Deceased was born in Derby, England, July 13, 1822, and with her husband (who preceded her some two years ago) emigrated to Utah in 1852. At the session of the city council held Tuesday, Nov. 21, a communication was received from Jno. P. Cahoon, in which he stated that the pipe for the city waterworks would arrive in a few days and asked to be informed how many hydrants the city would require, and where they were to be installed. Thursday, Nov. 23, Ed Stein, a chauffeur for the automobile between here and Sandy operating for the Utah Automobile company of Salt Lake City, was tried before Justice McConne for fast driving. The defendant was dismissed on the grounds of insufficient evidence. Four witnesses testified that the machine was going faster than the limit of speed rate. This was counteracted by the defense putting on the stand G. H. Lyon, an expert tester of speed. Mr. Lyon maintained that it would be impossible for a machine of that weight and capacity to travel more than 12 miles an hour. He got his experience by maintaining the machine from the Lyon Drug company to the city jail. His testimony was sufficient justification for the acquittal of the defendant.
