Lars C. Peterson Awarded \$3,000 In Suit Against Bullion-Beck,

Peterson against the Buillon Beck and Champion Min-ing company. The plaintiff had leased a block of ground in the Bullion Beck mine, and while he was working the same and extracting ore he claims that the company leased to one John Malvy mother block of ground immediately above plaintiff's block; and that the said block of ground in such a man-ner as to cause the ground above the plaintiff to cave down on his ore bodplaintiff to cave down on his ore bod-ies, and cover them up and thus prevent the plaintiff's pursuing his work. The plaintiff sued for \$15,000 damages, and the jury after being out all night returned this morning with a verdict of \$3,000 for the plaintiff.
