He will also endeavor to enlist the Commercial club and the Women's Federation in the enterprise.

Throughout the country Mr. Brown has traveled and everywhere there is a municipal lodging house he has investigated conditions. He is enthusiastic over the good done by them and is, perhaps, as well informed as to their merits as any man or woman in the country.

"The fundamental idea of the municipal lodging house," said Mr. Brown, "is that of affording decent persons who are up against it a hot bath and a good bed. It is help to those who are out of work is invaluable and it is becoming a mighty factor in the uplift of many who need but a little helping hand to put them on their feet."

Mr. Brown comes of a distinguished family, but he has voluntarily devoted his life to helping those in need. He has mingled with the unfortunate as one of them and is thoroughly conversant with the conditions which confront them. There is no hardship which he has not gone through in his investigations and he is intensely earnest in his work.

THE ROUND OF THE THEATERS

THEATER—One of the most disheartening tasks set for the dramatic reviewer of a journal which professes to tell its readers the truth, and which insists that a certain standard of cleanliness be maintained in public entertainment—is to record his impressions of a show like "The Soul Kiss." It is doubly disheartening because, if the exact truth were told it might result in filling the house with people—not many women—whose unhealthy tastes are always on the lookout for the suggestive and salacious. At the risk, however, of drawing to the coil, and the most interesting that this or any other season has brought to the Salt Lake theater.

The long and dreary evening, most of which was sat through in stony silence by a big and brilliant audience, saw a few occasional glimmers of ability on the stage, the first of which was the recitation "Actors of the Old School," rendered by Mr. Grinnell, but was totally lacking in character. The play, "The Soul Kiss," is a comedy and Scotch costumes, with the accompanying rendition of some of Harry Lauder's music and the dancing of the ballet star, Miss Perina, were also good, but insufficient to serve as star features. No one in the company possesses any particular singing ability, and the whole story is so tame and the plot so silly that it takes the patience of the audience to the limit.

The chorus is large and handsomely gowned, but aside from these few redeeming features the whole entertainment belongs in the category of things that ought to be restricted to the connoisseurs for which it was prepared, the faded appetites of Broadway rounders.

The bill runs throughout the week and will be followed by George M. Cohan in "The Yankee Prince."

ORPHEUM—First nighters in the ballroom were aroused from sleep by a glittering, gorgeous, human passion flower, when Senora Rosario Guerrero, a Spanish dancer, presented "The Rose and the Dagger" at the Orpheum Monday night. Guerrero, out-Guerrero Carmen in a series of highly erotic movements, and the general tone of the dance is febrile in the extreme. The woman is febrile by Le Pagan, and they perform in pantomime. The vehicle for the sensational dance is a plot whereby the woman falls into the power of a bandit, when she escapes to his love hut from a raging storm. Rosario's costume is built on decollete lines, and during the dance she throws off a slipper, and invites the bandit to place it in her mouth. The bandit, at first set upon murdering the woman for the numerous jewels which sparkle on her breast. But she, perceiving his intentions, deliberately makes love to him in rather nervous fashion. The bandit it supposed to become crazed by her beauty and the charm of the devilish dance. At any rate, he draws

his long knife from his waist-belt and gives it to the enchantress in exchange for a rose from her corsage upon which she proceeds to stab the bandit to death.

Rosario Guerrero is about as "tropical" a dancer as has ever shown Tahiti variations on the Spanish dances, and is certain to pack the house.

Tom Waters makes a great hit in his quaint pantomime and monologue of story, song and mimicry. He wins the heart by being natural, and one feels as though Tom were giving his entertainment just because he likes to make other folks happy.

James F. Kelly and Annie M. Keat stir up a delicious hodge-podge of comedy, singing and dancing. They spring several rich, fresh gags that are worth while.

Ray Montgomery and the Hesley sisters, Anna and Jennie, have a rattling good novelty singing and dancing skit. They wear beautiful costumes in a French style.

Murray and Mack perpetrate a humorous roset on football, and their old, familiar faces look just as foolish and lovable as ever.

Sansone and Della are clever novelty gymnasts, while Spaulding and Hiege bring out a funny trapeze stunt. The Orpheum orchestra plays a selection from Puccini's "Madame Butterfly" in a way that delights music lovers.

COLONIAL—"The Time, the Place and the Girl" was greeted by a large audience at the Colonial theater Monday evening, and those who attended were not disappointed in the production. The show was here a year ago, but now has a different cast, except in the case of the nurse. There is a vim and "go" to the play which makes it popular and the dialogue as well as the music is fresh and snappy. The bright, particular star of the company is Robert G. Pitkin, who appears as Happy Johnny Hicks. His effervescent good nature and witty lines kept the audience in constant good humor. Elizabeth Goodall, the nurse, looked and acted the part of the delightful manager of a model health sanitarium. The show was far above the part called for, and won the audience many times by her acting and singing. J. B. Kinslow as the black sheep, was good, and witty lines kept the audience in constant good humor. The play goes all week.

RAILROAD NEWS

DECREASE IN IDLE CARS.

The bulletin of the American Railway Association states that on October 12, the total surplus of cars on the lines of the United States and Canada stood at 25,971, as compared with 25,388 on September 29, the date of the last report. The decrease is 583 or about 2 per cent. It is expected that the surplus will be somewhat further reduced. In the New England and middle Atlantic states the surplus has been in available cars was continued. Traffic in the middle west was heavy. Northwestern car loadings were, as usual, heavy. Most noticeable was the increase in freight traffic on the south Atlantic and gulf lines. The far west, including the Pacific coast, showed a heavy decrease in the number of idle cars. Conditions in the southwest were practically the same as in the preceding fortnight. Canadian lines reported an increase in cars which, however, was unimportant. Chairman Hale states that there seems to be no doubt but that railroads are carrying as much freight as in October 1907.

CHINA'S NEW RAILROAD.

Writing of the opening of the railroad from Peking to Kalgan and of the extraordinary demonstrations of popular and official enthusiasm which accompanied it, the New York Tribune says that "though the road is at present only 122 miles long, it is of enormous commercial importance and of the greatest significance to China. It is the first important railroad in China to be built entirely by the Chinese. The rails and rolling stock were imported, but in other respects the enterprise is purely Chinese. It was laid for out of their earnings in the Northern Railways of China, without borrowing a dollar, and the work of building it has developed a fine force of young Chinese engineers who will be of great service in further undertakings. The road runs from Peking up the valley of the Yangtze river, in a northwesterly direction, beyond the Great Wall to Kalgan. That city, at the northwest of China and near the borders of Shan-si, is one of the greatest centers of Mongolian trade. Although the road has been in operation for less than a month, its volume of traffic is already large and highly profitable, and it promises to secure almost a monopoly of commerce between China and Mongolia. Surveys have been made for the extension of the road across Shan-si to the Hoang river, and thus almost to the border of Mongolia, opening to trade and industrial development a region of incalculable wealth. It is in Shan-si that the great coal and iron deposits are found, comprising 12,000 square miles of territory from eight to forty feet thick, and an almost equal area of bituminous coal."

C. R. & Q. PROSPERING.

The annual report of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad company recently published makes a favorable impression.

There is a substantial gain in the gross operating revenue, the operating expenses also were reduced materially, leading to a gain of \$1,592,759 in the net. It is to be noted that the principal change in the operating cost was in the item of maintenance of way, representing the improvement of repairs, etc., which could be legitimately deferred until more prosperous times. Fixed charges increased \$908,495, but notwithstanding this the balance applicable to dividends on the \$110,835,100 of stock was equal to 11.1 per cent actually paid. While the most important element in the present position of the Burlington system is its recent acquisition of the control of the Colorado & Southern at an expense of about \$14,000,000, the report speaks briefly on the transaction, merely stating that it will ultimately prove beneficial to both properties.

FIRST WESTERN PACIFIC TRAIN.
The first through train over the Western Pacific road is due in this city Wednesday, from San Francisco, with Vice Presidents Schack and Levy. Capt. T. H. Wythe has gone west on a special to meet them. It is expected that on the arrival of the inspecting officials the traffic staff will be appointed.
