## SERICULTURE—INTERESTING NEWS FROM FRANCE.

SALT LAKE CITY, March 21, 1872.

Editor Deseret News:

Last December three samples of our domestic silk-worm eggs were exported by me to France. Having received a lengthy and most important letter from my correspondent, I feel happy to present to our silk growers a few interesting items on that subject.

My correspondent is a celebrated silk culturist of Vaulx, one of the most beautiful and fruitful departments of Southern France. He is one of the leading importers of foreign silk-worm eggs, and on that account a gold medal has been awarded to him by the French government. That gentleman owns a magnificent experimental cocoonery, to test the quality of his imported silk-worm eggs.

"By the external aspect only of your Utah eggs," says he, "I can foretell that they are healthy and perfectly reliable. They will produce silk of the first quality. A small portion of them have been subjected to an early experimental hatching in my cocoonery. They will hatch on the 6th of March, and the worms will spin their cocoons on the 10th of April. Then I will write again to tell you the result of my experiment and the price I have got for your eggs."

According to another statement, my correspondent firmly believes that Utah being located under about the same latitude and enjoying the same atmospheric and climatic influences as those of Chili in South America, our silk and eggs will always command the highest price in the French market. And so great is the demand for a superior quality of silk and eggs in Europe that China, Japan and America are utterly unable to supply these wants.

To secure a share of that extremely rich trade, I earnestly suggest to our silk culturists to discard, as soon as convenient, all their small size and common silk worms, and adopt a superior breed, I mean the large golden yellow annual race. It is the very best for Utah.

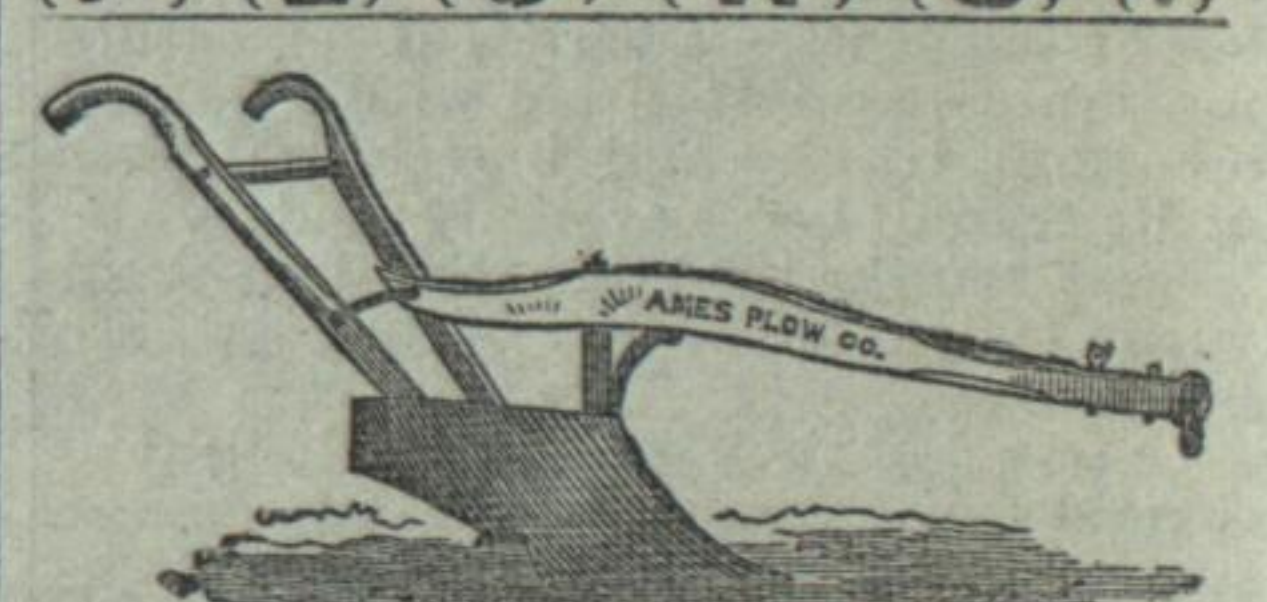
