POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT. WASHINGTON, Feb. 17, 1864. AN ACT

Authorizing the issuing of executions against judgment debtors, non-residents of the county.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Andersen Trine Utah: That whenever judgment is rendered Allen M M in any of the Courts of this Territory, and it shall be made to appear to the court in which such judgment is rendered, by affidavit of the judgment creditor or his attorney, that the judgment debtor is a resident of another county, stating in said affidavit the name of the county in which such judgment debtor re- Castow Mrs Rachellino sides, the court rendering such judgment is hereby authorized to issue a writ of execution on such judgment against the non-resident judgment debtor in the same manner as if such judgment debtor was a resident of the county in which the judgment was rendered, directed to the proper officer in which such judgment debtor resides; Provided that if such writ be issued by a Justice of the Peace, it shall be duly attested by the Clerk of the Probate Court, of the county in which such Justice resides.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the officer to whom such writ of execution is directed to proceed thereon in the same manner as if such writ had issued from a court in his own county, and make returns thereof to the court issuing the same without unnecessary delay. Approved January 14, 1864.
