May 11th, 1848; was ordained an Elder February 11th, 1851, when he commenced to preach the gospel, which he did whenever he had an opportunity; emigrated in 1879, came to Springville, where he lived until his death. She was 8 years old last May. She was a twin and leaves her little brother John to mourn her loss.

OBITUARY.

JONATHAN PUGMIRE, son of Jonathan Pugmire and his wife Elizabeth Barnes, was born December 7th, 1823, at Carlisle, Cumberland, England. Died at St. Charles, Idaho, September 18th, 1880. Bishop Pugmire was baptized on the 14th day of November, 1841, in the River Mersey, Liverpool, by Elder John James. He emigrated from Liverpool with his father's family on the 11th of February, 1844, in the ship Isaac Allerton, and landed at Nauvoo on the 5th of April of the same year. From that day till the Saints left Nauvoo, he shared in common with the people of God. In the month of October, 1844, he was ordained a member of the 22nd Quorum of Seventies. On the 21st of April, 1846, he left Montrose, Iowa, with his family, for Winter Quarters, arrived there on a Monday evening, and the following day left with the Mormon Battalion. After an absence of sixteen months he returned and found his family at Florence. He arrived in Salt Lake City in September, 1848. Early in 1849 he was called by President Young to work in the public blacksmith shop, where he continued for fourteen years, ten years of that time he was foreman. In 1861 he was ordained Bishop of the Seventh Ward in Salt Lake City. In the spring of 1864, he left Salt Lake City with his family for Bear Lake Valley and located in what is now known as St. Charles. In March, 1878, he was appointed tithing agent for the Bear Lake Stake of Zion, in which position he acted till his death.

On Saturday the 18th inst., he sat down to dinner with his family, and seemed to be in excellent spirits. After dinner he went to the store, where he remained for about one hour, when he came back and laid down, saying he felt a severe pain between his shoulders which soon extended to both arms, then over his heart. He lived about one hour and a half after he came back to the house and died from what is supposed to be neuralgia of the heart. He leaves a large family and a numerous circle of friends and acquaintances to mourn his absence. He was a faithful and true Latter-day Saint, ever willing and ready to respond to the calls of his brethren, to assist and build up the great latter-day work in which he was a firm believer. The funeral was held at half-past 10 o'clock Sept. 20th, in the St. Charles meeting-house. On the stand were Apostle C. C. Rich, Pres. G. Osmond, Bishops Hunt and Price, with many others. President Rich delivered a well-timed discourse on the occasion, many being gathered together from the various Wards of this Stake. President Osmond made a few very consolatory remarks for those thus called to mourn. The body was conducted from the meeting-house to the grave by an escort of thirty-seven carriages, well filled with the mourners and friends of the deceased. The ground was dedicated with a suitable prayer offered up by President Rich.—Com. Millennium Star, please copy.
