McClellan Family Reunion.

PAYSON, U. T., August 10th, 1874.

Editor Deseret News:

On the 8th inst. I attended a family reunion at the residence of Bro. Wm. C. McClellan, in this place, that was to me one of the pleasantest occasions of my life.

It was Father James McClellan's 70th birthday, and he had come from far off Santa Clara, away in Utah's sunny Dixie, to meet with his posterity from different parts of the Territory, to enjoy with them a happy reunion.

A bounteous repast was spread at noon under an awning in the orchard, and the aged veteran sat down to it with his four sons and six daughters, with their numerous progeny, numbering in all 77 souls. There were also seated at the table his wife, formerly sister Newell Knight, and a number of her children and grandchildren; also a few friends of the family who had been invited to participate in the festivities of the day.

After dinner had been discussed and the table cleared, the assemblage were seated under the delightful shade of the canopy and waving trees, and were addressed by Elder J. B. Fairbanks, Bishop J. S. Tanner, Father McClellan, and Brothers I. M. Coombs, John Loveless, Wm. C. McClellan, Samuel W. McClellan, James Loveless, Hugh J. McClellan and J. Jasper McClellan.

Father McClellan emigrated to this Territory in the year 1850 and settled in this town, where he lived an honored and respected citizen until the year 1864, when he was sent on a mission south to assist in building up that portion of the Territory. He located at Beaver Dams, but that place being destroyed by a flood he removed to Santa Clara, where he has resided and labored ever since. Himself and wife, in addition to other home industries, have given considerable attention to sericulture at that place, and have met with encouraging success. I was pleased to notice on the shoulders of Sister McClellan a most beautiful silk mantle made of silk spun by worms that her own hands had fed. It is a garment that might grace a queen.

Father McClellan and wife return to their home this week. I. M. COOMBS.

More About the Murder of the Navajoes.

KANAB, August 5th, 1874.

Editor Deseret News:

Last night Mr. Boyde and Mr. Hubbel (not Hubbard, as spelled in my last) returned from their trip down the Sevier to this place. They have been much longer away than they anticipated, but have spared no pains in making a thorough investigation and have obtained many of the facts in the case relating to the killing of the four Navajoe Indians last December, also three of their horses and some equipage.

The evidence obtained proves beyond the shadow of a doubt that Mr. McCarthy, his son and Mr. Clinger were the leaders in this bloody tragedy, and they now seek to screen themselves under the plea of having acted in self-defense. The facts in the case are as follows--

The four Navajoes were on a trading expedition to the "Utes" known as Indian Joe's band, who range in the vicinity of Grass Valley, on the East Fork of the Sevier. The Navajoes had to pass by Mr. McCarthy's and Clinger's on their way up the river and they traded with Mr. Clinger four blankets for one horse. They made their way to Joe's camp and then traded 20 blankets for four horses and obtained in the trade a sack of venison.

On their return they passed by McCarthy's and Clinger's, went into some of the houses and got some corn shucks for smoking purposes and camped for the night in a log hut, the weather being severe at the time, where they were found next morning roasting some of their venison. It appears McCarthy thought they must have killed a beef belonging to him and demanded a horse for pay. The Navajoes could not understand this demand, there being no one present that could interpret for either of the parties.

ties. It is said the Indians went out of the house and talked among themselves, and evidently supposing nothing was seriously the matter they returned into the house. Soon after this they were fired upon and two of their number killed. The other two remained in the house until the party outside attempted to set fire to it, when they rushed out and seized a couple of horses and made off. They were closely pursued for about fifteen miles, when one of their horses gave out and they both rode the other horse for a short distance. By this time their pursuers had come within gunshot and the hindmost one fell, having, when found, fourteen bullet holes in his body. The other jumped from his horse and hid in a rocky canyon, having received a ball in his back, about two inches from the bone, which passed clear through him. After eleven days' travel on his hands and knees, without clothing or food, excepting roots, exposed to the frost and snow, he made his way home to tell the tale of blood and cruelty.

Mr. Boyde informed us that the agent at Fort Defiance had expressed his regret at our people vacating their improvements at the Mooncopy, and that the 100 stand of Spencer rifles with 100 rounds of cartridge to each, given by the Department to the Navajoes, had been withheld from them by the agency until this matter should be settled and the Indians placed on peaceable terms with the whites.
