## BEEKEEPERS' CONVENTION.

SALT LAKE CITY, April 8th, 1882.

Editor Deseret News:

The Territorial Beekeepers' Convention assembled at the Council House, April 6, 1882.

President A. M. Musser presiding.

Prayer by N. T. Porter.

Salt Lake County was represented by Vice-President Samuel McKay, E. Stevenson and others; Davis County, by N. T. Porter; Weber County, by R. M. Birch, bee inspector of that county; Box Elder County, by Chas. Conolly; Tooele County, by Secretary T. W. Lee and John McLaw; Sanpete County, by C. A. Madsen.

Letters were read from various parts of the Territory. Mrs. Anne C. Woodberry, of St. George, Washington County, writes that in the spring of 1881 she had in her care 45 hives of bees, increase 16; lost five during the summer, leaving 56 in good condition. Had taken 2,200 lbs of honey, mostly from top boxes; no dis ease of any kind in that place.

Washington, Washington County, Mr. John Price writes, March 26th, 1882: Six years ago I began beekeeping with one swarm, and now I have 88 hives of bees in good condition; have lost six swarms by bee moth, no foul brood in this place. There are 175 hives of bees in Washington. No trouble in wintering or summering stands under shed roofs, to shield them from our hot Dixie sun. We average 75 lbs. of honey to each hive, but have taken 1624 lbs. from one hive.

Mr. Silas Richards writes from Union, Salt Lake Co., Utah, March 27th: We have 11 bee-keepers here, 67 hives, lost 12, balance 55. We generally cultivate natural swarming, do not use the extractor, neither disturb the lower hive or brood nest, use scarcely any bee veils or gloves.

Mr. Joseph E. Johnson writes from St. George, March 31st, 1882, that there are about 500 colonies in Washington, Kane and Iron counties, yielding from 20 to 100 lbs. to the colony, varying in price from 15 to 25 cents per pound, the supply being equal to the demand; not a single case of foul brood has been known there. The best honey season is during May and June. If we have late rains we have some fall bloom, and as the winters are warm bees fly nearly every day, consequently we are liable to about 25 per cent losses by starvation unless fed when supplies are short.

President James Cullimore writes from Pleasant Grove, Utah County: A press of business prevents me from giving a full report of our association. I have 115 colonies, and have lost only one up to this time. Wintered on summer stand, after a long winter, honey is scarce in the hives. Some in this neighborhood have lost many and some all of their bees.

Mr. T. W. Lee says: In Tooele City we have 16 beekeepers and 103 colonies of bees, put into winter

quarters on summer stands. Losses 24, leaving 82 in tolerably good condition. No foul brood; our bees are mostly hybrids.

Mr. Chas. Conolly said: As bee inspector, he had destroyed 21 colonies of foul brood in Box Elder County, and 14 colonies the following season; and on his return home expects to destroy others infected, and try to rid the country of this dreadful pest. He started with two stands and now has 46. There are about 350 colonies in the county. He wintered his bees under cover, on summer stands, about four inches apart, filled in between with hay, chaff or straw, gave upper ventilation, put a cloth over lower hives to keep them dry and warm and had no trouble in wintering. The honey sells at 20 cents per pound.

Bee inspector R. M. Birch, of Weber County, said: The county only paid him for destroying foul brood when he was called on, and as his calls were rather scarce, he had not done much at it. He winters on summer stands in a shed, puts cloth on lower hives, and fills the upper box with hay; they wintered well.

Mr. C. A. Madsen, of Gunnison, Sanpete County, said their bees, although few in number, had wintered well, and as he learned more about bees, his interest increased. They intended to progress in bee culture in Gunnison.

Mr. N. T. Porter, of Davis County, said they had been sorely troubled with foul brood and heavy losses; had lost his bees, but was now starting again with better success; had placed chopped feed near his hives early this spring, and they worked wonderfully in it.

Prest. Musser then explained the law on foul brood.

Vice-President Samuel McKay took pride in bee-keeping, and had always had good success in wintering his bees until this very hard winter. He had lost 56 out of 87 colonies. He thought the severe frosts had cracked some of the honey combs, and the damp of the hives soured the honey, sickening and killing many of the bees, also that many had been lost in flight on warm days, thus weakening the colonies. His stocks have plenty of honey in them. Foul brood was first imported into our county and spread fearfully in many places; it must be destroyed if we succeed with bees. Most of his losses occurred in February. He thinks our losses in this county will be over 50 per cent.

Mr. Wm. Egan said: his experience was quite different this winter from that of any previous year, he had only five hives left alive out of 40. For want of time he had neglected to pack his chaff about the hives last fall, hence his loss. Previously, when he had protected his bees, he scarcely lost any. He had reversed the combs of the hive that he placed in the last fall, placed a comb of honey over them and a cloth giving them plenty of ventilation, and they had come out all right.

Edward Stevenson said, we must provide better winter quarters for our bees in order to insure success, especially as our winters are so changeable in this high altitude. I have placed some of my bees under shed roofs packed with chaff, with a movable front ten feet long and two feet wide, leaving four inches back and front, boxing the entrance and leaving a passage for the bees from the hive through the movable front. Thus the hot rays of the sun will not so easily cause the bees to fly until the air is sufficiently warm for them to return home again. This makes a cheap chaff hive, as six hives can be placed together in one packing and be kept warm until late in the Spring, thus inducing early brooding. They must have upper ventilation and chaff cushion in the upper box. In our southern Dixie scarcely any bees die because of the cold.

Our meeting was well attended and manifested an increased desire to make Utah a success in the bee culture until the land shall flow with honey as it already does with milk. The meeting adjourned until Oct. 6th, at this place, at 7 p.m.
