INKY DARKNESS IN PLACES.

The Loss of Life and Property-The Work of Destruction Unabated And Spreading.

Tacoma, Sept. 12 .- The nearest disastrous fire is at Elma, 60 miles southwest of here, where six large lumber mils and ten houses have been destroyed

At 9 o'clock all wires to Gray's Harbor country went down and no word can be received from Elma or Aber-

About 11 o'clock a telegram reported Enumelaw, in King county, on the main line of the Northern Pacific, east, in great danger. The town appeals for a fre-engine and hose, but, as many small brush fires are burning on Tacoma's outksirts, none can be spared. Man Kills His Former Wife, Her Father, Assaults Her Sister.

Pierce, N. Mrs, Breyer ran from the house just as Niegenfind drew a revolver and fired at her husband, who received five bullets in the body. Niegenfind they reloaded his revolver and began firing at Mrs. Breyer. After receiving a seri-ous wound in the shoulder she made her escape. Niegenfind's former wife then appeared and attempted to assist her mother, and received a bullet in the breast, dying instantly. Niegen-find then made his escape. He met and then made his escape.
