

# HEARST MAKES REPLY TO ROOT

Declares He is Proud of the Enemies He Has Made, Putting Secretary of State First.

NEXT CROKER AND MCCARREN.

Says McClellan Has Stolen the Office He Holds and He Knows It.

New York, Nov. 2.—With falling voice, but determined spirit, William H. Hearst gubernatorial candidate on the Independence league and Democratic tickets, started out tonight to fulfill the program mapped out for him by his campaign managers. The schedule called for 13 addresses, before many audiences in Brooklyn and Queens county. At his first appearance, however, it was evident that the candidate had already overtaxed his vocal organs, and later on he was repeatedly compelled to abandon his repressed purpose of rewarding all of the thousands who had turned out and waited patiently to hear him.

The opening meeting was held at a theater in Brooklyn. Mr. Hearst was the first speaker, and it was plain that it was an effort for him to pitch his voice high enough to reach all of the big audience.

The candidate, however, found voice enough to pay his respects to Richard Croker, whose recent cablegram to Senator P. H. McCarrren was construed as a condemnation of Tammany Hall's endorsement of Mr. Hearst's candidacy.

Secy. Elihu Root, who last night sided with Mr. Hearst at Utica, also came in for a severe arraignment. Mr. Croker and Secy. Root, the speaker declared, had furnished the most convincing evidence by the recent expression that the "corporation" elements of the Democratic and Republican parties were united in their opposition to him because of his onslaught upon illegal business combinations.

Generally throughout the evening Mr. Hearst confined himself to a set speech, substantially as follows:

"I was attacked last night by Mr. Croker, who claimed to represent Democracy, and Mr. Root, who claimed to represent Republicanism. I know nothing that has tended more clearly to show the truth of my statement than in this campaign corporation Democrats and corporation Republicans are united in support of the corporation lawyer at the head of the corporation ticket."

"Mr. Croker whose fee trust mayor drove out of office, endorses McCarrren as a noble representative of corporation Democracy. Mr. Root, corporation attorney for the Metropolitan traction company in the Jake Sharp bribery cases, and for the whisky trust, the tobacco trust, the steel trust, the sugar trust, the gas trust, the watch trust and the insurance trust, the New York Westchester & Boston franchise grab and the sugar trust."

"Mr. Root today, a public official, occupies a high place in the United States government, and who would represent the whole people of these United States regardless of party, has dragged his high position into a partisan campaign, and into a personal attack in a local situation in order to serve his corporate masters."

"Last year Mr. Ryan issued through Major McClellan postal cards bearing malicious and indecent attacks upon me, which the United States government wopped in the mails. This year Mr. Ryan puts forth these same indecent and slanderous attacks through his corporation attorney, through a man who is still his faithful servant, though in public office and paid by the people."

"It is natural that Mr. Root, who defended Boss Tweed, the most corrupt politician of his day, should side with Boss Croker, the most corrupt politician of the present day, in support of Mr. Hughes. It is natural that Mr. Root, who appeared for the Metropolitan Traction company, and who was himself accused of bribery by four men who testified under oath that he had given them money for their votes, should unite with Patrick McCarrren, a professional briber of the Standard Oil company, the gas trust and the Brooklyn Rapid Transit, to support Mr. Hughes and to oppose me."

"I have said that I am proud of the enemies I have made, and I am prouder of none than I am of Elihu Root, Boss Croker and Pat McCarrren."

"You know this man Croker is fighting me because I fought his fee trust mayor for betraying the people, and you know that this man Root is opposing me because I have fought the corporations that own him, the street railroad trust and the whisky trust, the steel trust and the sugar trust, and the gas trust, who employ him."

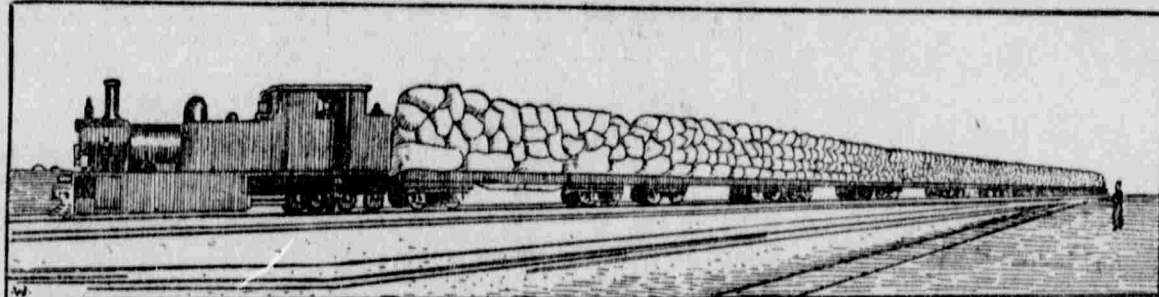

### INFORMATION FOR BIDDERS FOR PANAMA CANAL WORK.

Washington, Nov. 2.—Some idea of the  
vastness of the Panama canal project is  
conveyed in a circular issued by the com-  
mission today for the information of prospective  
bidders for constructing the canal. It is  
said that the quantities of material to  
be removed and to be applied to the  
work of construction are only approximate  
and even the location and character of  
structures may be changed. It is  
hoped, however, that exact information  
will be collected by the committee of  
five engineers who are charged to estimate  
a reasonable cost and time for com-  
pleting the canal.

The circular states under separate heads  
the character of the work to be done. The

amount of excavation is staggering in ex-  
tent. The summary shows that the esti-  
mated excavation and structural material in  
the sections are approximately as fol-  
lows:

Colon section, 4,455,000 cubic yards;  
Mimil, 11,000,000 yards; Gatun locks, ex-  
cavation, 3,500,000 yards; Concrete, 1,302,750

8,850,000 yards; cut iron, 32,000 pounds; steel  
gates, 1,170,000 yards; embankment, 1,100,000  
yards; back fill, 50,000 yards concrete,  
512,000 yards; cut iron, 32,000 pounds; steel  
gates, 1,170,000 yards; Lake Soa section,  
excavation, 1,600,000 yards; Soa locks, ex-  
cavation, 1,400,000 yards; back fill, 50,000  
yards; concrete, 92,000 yards; cut stone,  
50,000 yards; brick, 14,000 yards; cast iron,  
1,251,000 pounds; steel gates, 2,730,000  
pounds; Laboca dam, 4,300,000 yards; Cor-

opposing me because I have fought the  
Standard Oil trust and the gas trust  
and the Brooklyn Rapid Transit. These  
men and other corporation tools like  
them are the best proof of the truth  
of what I have said, that the men who  
are trying to defeat me in this cam-  
paign are the men who have been try-  
ing to rob you for years.

"He objected to my opposition to Dist.  
Atty. Jerome, and he praises Jerome as  
a Democrat of independence above all  
others. I have no personal feeling  
against Jerome. I have opposed him be-  
cause he has been faithless to the peo-  
ple and has betrayed the people's confi-  
dence."

"Mr. Root objects to my opposition to  
McClellan, and calls him a worthy heir  
to an honored name."

"I say that McClellan has stolen the  
office he now holds and he knows that  
he has stolen it, and that the proof of  
his theft is in those ballot boxes, and I  
challenge him now to allow those ballot  
boxes to be opened and those votes to  
be honestly counted."

"I see how Mr. Root, the corpora-  
tion lawyer and son of Thomas F.  
Ryan, can endorse George B. McClellan,  
the political puppet of Mr. Ryan and er-  
rand boy of the trusts that Mr. Root  
serves, but can Mr. Root endorse the  
theft of the election in New York City  
and the crime by which the rights of  
citizens were outraged and the liberties  
of citizens everywhere threatened?"

"Mr. Root objects to my opposition to  
Senator Knox. I have no personal hos-  
tility for Knox and I do not think that  
I have ever met him or seen him, but I  
do know that when I sent him docu-  
mentary evidence that absolutely convicted  
the coal roads of criminal combination  
and of crushing out independent coal  
mine owners, he pocketed the evidence  
and refused to act for two years, al-  
though his United States district attor-  
ney, Burnett, had reported to him that  
this evidence sustained all my charges  
against the coal trust and warranted  
their prosecution, and although he re-  
commended to Knox that the govern-  
ment institute proceedings against these  
roads in the eastern district of Pennsylv-  
ania."

"I was finally compelled to proceed  
outside of the attorney general's office  
and brought my evidence before the In-  
terstate commerce commission, and be-  
cause of the interminable delay and in-  
adequate powers of the interstate com-  
merce commission, I introduced the  
railroad rate bill in Congress, which  
the Republican party takes the credit  
for. I positively assert that the Re-  
publican party stole the greater part of  
my bill, and that they would have had  
a better bill if they had stolen all of it."

"And that is also my answer to Mr.  
Root's criticism of my course in Con-  
gress."

"Mr. Root objects to my criticism of  
Thomas Taggart, and goes over from  
the corporation side of the Republi-  
can party to defend the national chair-  
man of the corporation wing of the  
Democratic party."

"I have no personal feeling against  
Mr. Taggart. I have opposed him be-  
cause he conducted a gambling resort,  
where women and children were allowed  
to play. This gambling house has been  
closed up by the Republican governor of  
Indiana. I have opposed Taggart be-  
cause he is a corrupt politician and  
represents Belmont and the corpora-  
tions on the Democratic committee. I  
have opposed him because he stands in  
opposition to honest Democrats and  
honest American citizens everywhere."

"I do not conduct my campaign or my  
newspapers according to my personal  
prejudices, but for the interest of hon-  
est citizens."

"Finally, I say that the same recog-  
nized and unwritten rule that makes  
the president of the United States  
president of the people, and not of any  
faction or section, should apply to the  
officers of his administration, and that  
when Elihu Root, secretary of state of  
the United States, drags his high fed-  
eral office into a state election and into  
a personal and partisan attack, he de-  
grades his office to his own level."
