## LOCAL BRIEFS.

Three Building Permits.—Three permits for improvements aggregating \$1,000 were granted by Building Inspector Hirsh Monday.

Salt Harvest.—The inland Crystal Salt company will complete Dec. 1 the harvesting of 40,000 tons of salt for the current season.

Returns by Telephone.—Both of the telephone companies announce having made elaborate arrangements for furnishing news about the election this evening to their subscribers. Returns will also be announced at the several club houses in the city.

Creditors to Meet in Denver.—The creditors of the Schreder & Son Nursery company will meet Thursday next at 11 a.m. in the Empire building, corner of Glenarm and Sixteenth streets, Denver, when the future policy of the company will be outlined.

Residence Changes.—Hands—H. J. Cook of the Royal Cleaning company has purchased the six-room brick residence at 660 south Sixth East for \$4,000. The sale was made by A. E. Cook, former bookkeeper at the Calumet hotel through Meeks and McCarney.

Mrs. Mary Teats to Lecture.—At Monday afternoon's meeting of the W. M. F. U. arrangements were discussed for the reception of Mrs. Mary E. Teats, the national poultry evangelist of the Union and the National Poultry League. She is to begin a course of lectures in this city Nov. 13.

Articles Amended.—An amendment to the articles of incorporation of the Commercial Block association has been filed, empowering the association to sell or transfer its property in lot 3, block 79, plat A, at corner of Commercial and Second South streets in this city.

Shipments of Trout Fry.—The fish and game commissioner has completed the early fall shipment of trout fry to the various streams over the state, and is filling up the state hatchery at Murray, so that in two weeks he expects to have two million young trout to further populate the streams.

Funeral of Mrs. Greenstein.—The body of Mrs. Ethel Greenstein of Fillmore was received at 8. A. Evans's undertaking establishment for interment in the Hebrew (Jewish) cemetery. The funeral was held this afternoon conducted with the rites of the Orthodox synagogue.

American Fork Man Killed.—The body of John Sharp, killed on the Salt Lake City bridge recently, was identified Monday night as a brother of Will Sharp of American Fork. The funeral will be held from O'Donnell's chapel Wednesday afternoon, with burial in city cemetery.

Eastern Astronomer Here.—Prof. F. M. Folk, an eastern astronomer en route to the Lick observatory in California, is in the city for a few days. He goes west to study Halley's comet which will be visible from this city next month. It is "now' sun' east" over the Wasatch mountains.

Inspectors Nevada Sheep.—Dr. Murray, chief of the bureau of animal industry, has returned from an inspection of sheep in Nevada. He found the herds in fair condition, with little evidence of scab, and no neosarcocystis to speak of. He says the herds are now all in transit to the winter ranges.

E. B. Wicks Home Again.—E. B. Wicks has returned from an absence of several weeks in New York and most of the time being spent visiting with relatives in his old home, Syracuse. He found the city growing with astonishing rapidity in all directions, and business everywhere in that section in a healthy condition.

Fun at St. Mary's.—The Hallowe'en celebration at St. Mary's academy this year failed to have the usual success in the history of the academy. It consisted of an elaborate banquet, at which the students appeared in elegant and novel costumes; the object being to afford the students some practice in the etiquette of such occasions.

Supernumerary Trip of Marshal.—Deputy United States Marshal Lucian H. Smith has returned to the city after visiting Moroni, Wales, Payson, Mapleton, Spanish Fork, Eureka and Mammoth for the purpose of serving subpoenas for witnesses and summonses for jurors for the November term of the United States district court, which begins Nov. 12.

Organ Recitals Continue.—The tabernacle organ recitals are continuing this week, although Prof. McMillan was uncertain last week about their continuance. Tracy Cannon is playing the first two days in the week, Mr. Kimball Wednesday, and Prof. McMillan Friday and Saturday. When the season is closer, announcement will be made from Bishop Nibley's office.

Lake Level Stationery.—The level of the great lake remained stationary for the entire month of October, at 4.3 feet above the zero level. It is likely to remain so until the winter precipitation comes.

She is survived by her husband, J. P. Gray, her brother-in-law, and five sisters and three brothers.
