Bergdorff, alleged to be members of a secret service bureau bert, has confessed to his complicity in the crime. He admits that he left Paterson, N. J., in company with Bresin this city. The men were arrested on a charge The men were arrested on a charge of conspiracy and aiding and abetting gamblers, and were arraigned before Justice Jerome in the rooms of the society. They were each held in \$3,000 bail. It is claimed that the two detec-tives had approached Agent Dillon, of ci, and that they went together to Monza, near Milan. Gianotti started a street row at Monza the day of the murder in order to distract the atten-tion of the police while Bresci attacked the king.

U! S. Steel Corporation Wants the Tennessee Coal and Iron Company.

May Prove to be a Great Factor in Settlement of the Strike of Amalgamated Association.

New York, Aug. 10 .- It is reported in well informed grounds that the United States Steel corporation has made certain advances to the managers of the Tennessee Coal & Iron company and al. lied industries in the South, by which all the southern iron and steel works will come under the control of the United States Steel compration, says the Tribune. While the report mentioned could not be verified in official quarters, it was said on excellent authority that negotiations have been under way for the past year for the purchase by

the big steel trust of the Tennessee Coal & Iron company. It is also learned that leading inter-ests in the United States Steel corporation have been in conference with the banking powers behind the Tennessee Coal & Iron company, but the result of the conference has not yet been made known

A few months ago the United States Steel coroporation submitted certain proposals to the Tennessee Coal & Iron company and the negotiations were un der way at the time of the first out-break of the Amalgamated association.

If the United States Steel corporation can secure the various iron and steel works in the South the Amalgamated association may find it difficult to make a success of its present efforts to the up the steel and iron industry of the country. It may be therefore that the Tennessee Coal & Iron company will be an important factor in the settlement of the strike.
