

Relations between Austria and Italy are on a good footing, and he knew of no Catholic power which could be justified in offering the Pope an asylum.

PARIS, 18.—The suppression of the *Gauleis* and the *Constitutionnel* is exciting indignation.

ST. PETERSBURG, 18.—The budget submitted by the Minister of Finance to the committee of the empire shows that, during the past year, the receipts have exceeded the expenditures four hundred thousand roubles.

PARIS, 18.—The assassination of the Prussian soldier at Lemeville, a few days since, was committed by a man named Crelel. He has been arrested and confesses that he committed the deed. Several petitions have already been sent to Thiers, asking him to pardon the prisoner.

MADRID, 18.—The ministry has directed the governors of provinces to suppress the Internationalists at the same time not to interfere with liberty of speech, and to take no notice of the single utterance of the principles of the International party, as the laws of Spain provided no punishment for such utterances.

ROME, 18.—The Pope is suffering from a severe cold, and has been confined to his bed one day.

LONDON, 19.—There was a terrible explosion at a cartridge factory at Greenwich yesterday afternoon. The clothing of a large number of girls employed in the factory took fire, and they rushed shrieking through the surrounding marshes in hopes of quenching the flames. The factory is totally destroyed.

BOMBAY.—A dangerous revolt, among the Rookaps of India, has been suppressed by the troops, who marched direct to the headquarters of the rebel camp and completely defeated them, killing one hundred and taking several hundred prisoners. Quiet now prevails.

LOONDON, 19.—Mr. Horseman, M. P., in an address, last night, took a gloomy view of the political prospects, declaring the present government unfit to deal with English questions.

PARIS, 21.—Thiers yesterday, in reply to the deputation of the assembly which called upon him, to notify him of the refusal of that body to accept his resignation, said he was worn out and discouraged. He could not change his opinion, and he believed that conflicts, similar to the present one, were likely to occur between the legislative and executive departments of the government when the military and educational bills came before the assembly. Thiers further said that while for the present he considered it best to withdraw his resignation, the end was inevitable, and sooner or later he would be compelled to retire from the presidency of the republic.

Marshal MacMahon also called upon Thiers, yesterday, and appealed to him, on behalf of the army, to withdraw his resignation. The marshal said the army would obey the orders of the assembly, but would not be controlled by a dictatorship, which was likely to follow the unconditional retirement of the president.

CALCUTTA, 19.—Ramsing and other chiefs of the recent revolt have been captured, and on the 29th they and their followers were to be executed.

THE TERRITORIAL LEGISLATURE.

Thursday, Jan. 18.

COUNCIL.—Council met pursuant to adjournment.

A communication from Hon. C. M. Hawley expressing thanks for courtesies extended was received and read.

Councilor Jesse N. Smith motioned that a special committee be appointed to consider the necessity of a law on the subject of marriage, and, if necessary, to report a bill thereon. Seconded and carried.

The President appointed Councilors Jesse N. Smith, A. O. Smoot, and Wm. Jennings said committee.

Councilor Woodruff moved, in view of the distance of the residence of His Excellency the Governor, Geo. L. Woods, from the legislative hall, that a letter be addressed to the Hon. Secretary, Geo. A. Black, requesting him to suitably furnish a room in the City Hall for the convenience of the Governor during the present session of the Legislature. Seconded and carried.

Councilor Jesse N. Smith presented a communication from W. C. Mitchell, Assessor and Collector for Iron County, praying for the remittance of \$100.41 Territorial taxes for the year 1870, assessed in Spring and Eagle Valleys, the same being now attached to the State of Nevada; which was read and referred.

Councilor Jennings, from the Committee on Railroads, reported that the committee had examined the act providing for the incorporation of railroad companies, found all that was necessary for organizing railroad companies was provided in said act, found on examination of the Charter of

Salt Lake City, that the right was granted to the City, to control all railroads within its corporate limits, and therefore the committee deemed further legislation on the subject unnecessary. Report received.

Councilor Cannon presented "An Act defining the time of commencing Civil Actions," which was read, and ordered printed.

Councilor Cannon from the committee on Revenue, reported in favor of granting petition of Ellis M. Saunders, Assessor and Collector for Washington County, and William C. Mitchell, Assessor and Collector for Iron County, praying for remittance of unsettled Territorial taxes levied on settlers in Clover, Spring and Eagle Valleys, and Panacca, since found to be in Nevada. Referred, to be incorporated in Territorial Appropriation Bill.

In committee of the whole, Councilor Bigler, Chairman, the Council considered "an Act providing for holding a Convention to prepare a Constitution for the admission of Utah into the Union as a State," and recommended the following amendments:

2nd line, 1st Section, to read 5th day of February, and 5th line, 6th Section, to read 5th day of February. Accepted.

On motion of Councilor Jesse N. Smith, "an Act providing for holding a Convention to prepare a Constitution for the admission of Utah into the Union as a State," was made the order of the day for to-morrow.

HOUSE.—House met pursuant to adjournment.

The financial reports of Cache, Millard, and Tooele Counties, for the years 1870 and 1871, were presented and referred.

Adjourned till Friday, at 2 p. m.

COUNCIL.—Council met pursuant to adjournment.

Communications from Hon. J. L. High, and Gen. Geo. R. Maxwell, expressing thanks for courtesies extended, were received and read.

Councilor Woodruff, of the Committee on Agriculture, Trade and Manufactures, reported "an Act establishing stray pounds and prescribing regulations for conducting the same," which was read and received.

"An Act providing for holding a Convention to prepare a Constitution for the admission of Utah into the Union as a State," and "an Act providing for the election of Delegates to a Convention to prepare a Constitution for the admission of Utah into the Union as a State," were recommended.

Councilor Harrington, from the Committee on Judiciary, reported back "an Act providing for the election of Delegates to a Convention to prepare a Constitution for the admission of Utah into the Union as a State" with amendments, and recommended its passage. Received, and on motion of Councilor Cannon the title was amended to read, "an Act providing for holding a Convention to prepare a Constitution for the admission of Utah into the Union as a State," and the bill passed.

Councilor Cannon presented a bill for "an Act to prescribe the manner of conducting Criminal Proceedings," which was read and referred.

On motion of Councilor Woodruff, "an Act defining the time of commencing Civil Actions," was called up and referred.

On motion of Councilor Bigler the Council adjourned till Saturday at 11 a. m.

HOUSE.—House met pursuant to adjournment.

Mr. Peacock presented financial report of Sanpete County for the year 1870 and 1871, which was referred.

Mr. Rockwood moved that Mr. Z. Snow, Attorney-General of this Territory, be requested to report to this House, at as early a day as practicable, such official information as may be in his possession, relating to the decisions of the Supreme Court of this Territory on the subject of the Jurisdiction of the Probate Courts, and the offices of the Territorial Marshal and Attorney General, and whether or not any suit or suits are now pending relating to these subjects; if so, in what courts, and what is their condition. Carried.

Mr. Richards moved that the Auditor of Public Accounts be requested to report to this House whether or not there had been any demand made upon him by Mr. M. T. Patrick, U. S. Marshal for Utah, for funds to defray the expenses of the District Courts for the years 1870 and 1871; if so, when, and whether or not he had paid any expenses of these Courts, on Marshal Patrick's order, and if so, what amount, and whether or not any suit has been commenced against him to test his right to hold that office; if so, when, and what is the condition of that suit? Also, whether or not he has had any correspondence with Mr. Z. Snow, Attorney-General, relating to these subjects; if so, that he report that correspondence at his earliest convenience, with any other correspondence which may have passed between him and the Executive or any other of the Federal officers of the Territory on the subject. Carried.

Mr. Richards presented petition of Mr. John T. Snedaker, and 52 others, citizens of Salt Lake County, praying for a competent stock, trespass and damage law, which was read and referred.

Mr. Taylor presented a bill for "an Act entitled an Act providing for incorporating associations for mining, manufacturing, commercial and other industrial pursuits," which was read and referred.

Mr. Taylor presented petition of W. P. Appleby to be elected a Notary Public for Salt Lake County, which was read and referred.

Mr. Taylor presented petition of Orson Pratt, Sen., praying for relief, which was read and referred.

On motion of A. P. Rockwood, the Auditor of Public Accounts was requested to furnish the House an abstract report of the Secretary and Treasurer, as contemplated in Section 13 of an Ordinance incorporating the University of the State of Deseret. Approved Feb. 28th, 1850.

The financial report of Morgan County for the years 1870 and 1871 was presented and referred.

On motion of Mr. Preston, House adjourned till Saturday at 10 a. m.

Saturday, Jan. 20.

HOUSE.—Council amendments to "an Act Providing for holding a Convention to Prepare a Constitution for the Admission of Utah into the Union as a State," were read and concurred in.

Mr. Murdock presented the financial report of Beaver County, for the years 1870 and 1871. Referred.

Mr. Rowberry presented a bill for an Act amending an act entitled "an Act authorizing and empowering the secretary of the Territory to receive and collect fees in certain cases," approved Jan. 18, 1861. Read and referred.

On motion of Mr. Rockwood, the Committee on Counties were instructed to take into consideration the present boundaries of Counties and ascertain if by the running of the Territorial lines any part of the Territory is left without a County organization, and report by bill or otherwise.

On motion of Mr. Peacock, the committee on Claims and Appropriations were instructed to ascertain the present condition of the Great Seal of the Territory and, if in their judgment a new one is needed, to incorporate in the General Appropriation bill a sufficient amount to purchase a new seal.

Mr. S. S. Smith presented the financial report of Iron County for 1871. Referred. Adjourned till Monday Jan. 22nd, at 10 a. m.

COUNCIL.—Council met pursuant to adjournment.

A communication from Hon. James B. McKean, Chief Justice, thanking the Council for courtesies extended, was received and read.

"An Act pertaining to License," was taken up and read and ordered printed.

"An Act establishing stray pounds, and prescribing regulations for conducting the same," was taken up in its order and ordered printed.

On motion of Councilor Wm. Snow, the Council adjourned till Monday at 10 a. m.

Councilor Smoot, from Committee on Municipal Corporations and Townsites, reported back "an Act designating the time of holding the first election for city officers for Washington City, Washington County," and recommended its passage.

"An Act pertaining to licenses," was read and passed.

Councilor Smoot gave notice that on Wednesday next he would introduce a bill for "an Act to amend an act" entitled "an Act regulating the proceedings in civil cases in the courts of Justice in this Territory."

A communication from Hon. Geo. Black was received and read.

"An Act making sheep taxable property," was read and passed.

Monday, Jan. 22.

HOUSE.—The bill for an act making sheep taxable property, laid on the table on the 12th inst., was called up and passed.

An act for the protection of game was read and referred to committee on agriculture, trade, and manufactures.

The auditor of Public Accounts reported a list of disbursements made for the years 1870 and 1871 to officers of the Territory, for which no appropriation was made; read and referred.

The Auditor also communicated in reference to the offices of Auditor of Public Accounts and Warden of the Penitentiary, in answer to inquiries of the House.

On motion of Mr. W. S. Snow, the committee on Judiciary was instructed to take into consideration the act in relation to Grand and Petit Jurors and report by bill or otherwise whether in their judgment further legislation was needed pertaining to the same.

The Auditor of Public Accounts reported that there were no reports for the years 1870 and 1871 from the Deseret University on file in his office.

Adjourned till Tuesday at ten a. m.

The party was well attended, and the guests enjoyed themselves in good style, the music and dancing being lively and spirited, and nothing occurring to mar the pleasure of the occasion. Fairview, 20.—On Wednesday a little girl about two years of age, daughter of R. W. Westwood, of this place, was severely burned by the upsetting of a pot of boiling water. The lower part of her body was badly blistered. She died yesterday.
