For the week ending Nov. 1 there were 28 births reporetd to the board of health, 12 of which were males and 16 females; all were whites, and two twins were among the number. Twenty deaths were reported for the same period, 19 of which were residents of the city; 9 were males and 11 females. Four bodies were brought here for in-terment and 6 were shipped away for interement at other places. There were 19 cases of scarlet fever

in quarantine at the close of last re-port. For the period covered by this report, 6 new cases were reported and 9 released, leaving 16 cases in quarantine in 13 premises. Three cases of diphtheria developed during the week and one case was discharged as cured, leaving 4 flags displayed and 7 cases quarantined, an increase of 2 over last week. Two cases of smallpox were discharged during the week and none hav-ing been reported, left 9 cases quarantined under two flags. The cases of typhoid fever reported increased from 4 last week to 7 for the week of this report.

THIRTY THOUSAND COLONISTS. Business That Has Been Handled by

Santa Fe and S. P.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 1.-Thirty thousand colonists to California in two months is the record of the Southern Pacific and Santa Fe railroads, the re sult of the colonists' low rate excur sions from the east that were in effect during September and October. Of the number fully 5,000, it is claimed by passenger and colonist agents of the railroads have already become perma nently located in the state and many more are viewing the different regions north and south, with the object of selecting homes.

W. P. DALE QUITS.

Rio Grande Trainmaster Leaves Railroad for Mercantile Business.

W. P. Dale, the trainmaster at Help-, who recently was transferred to the cond division of the Denver & Rio Grande, has resigned to enter the mer-cantile business. He goes into partnerip with Supt. Rockwell of the second division, who also contemplates severing his connection with railroading.

WILL SUBMIT SCHEDULE.

Southern Pacific Trainmen and Switchmen Ask for Raise.

Oakland, Cal., Nov. 1 .- Within the next few days the orders of Railway Conductors, Trainmen and Switchmer will submit a schedule of wages to the uthern Pacific company. The sched ule' has been in readiness to submit for the past six months, but the unions awaited an opportune time before mak. ing their demands. The requests of the men are very much the same as those submitted by the engineers, firemen telegraphers and others. An increase 15 to 20 per cent is asked, together with a uniform rate of wages on all the divisions of the Attantic and Pacific systems. The demands will take the same general course that the others have. They will be passed upon by the respective departments and then refer-red to General Manager Agler and Ju-Kruttschnitt, assistant to President Harriman. These two gentleme in turn will pass upon the demands and send them to the committee appointed by President Harriman to confer with them. According to the bylaws of the unions the company is given 30 days to make an answer to the men.

NEW TIME CARD.

Minor Changes Go Into Effect on The Rio Grande Western Today.
