SERIOUS RUNAWAY CATASTROPHE

Mrs. Frank Dunn of Ogden Valley
Severely Injured in Junction City.

CHILD ACCIDENTALLY KILLED.

Little Bertha Wade Thrown From Her
Horse and Dies in Few
Minutes.

Ogden, July 2.—Shortly after 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon a serious runaway occurred on Washington avenue, resulting in painful injuries to Mrs. Frank Dunn of Ogden valley, and a severe shaking up to Richard Galloway and wife and children.

Mr. Galloway drove his team up to the watering trough in front of the barnyard to give them a drink. He stepped out upon the tongue to uncheck them, when suddenly the horses became frightened and started to run down Washington avenue northward. The vehicle collided with the cement curbing, and the occupants were thrown to the ground, but fortunately all escaped with slight scratches and bruises, excepting Mrs. Dunn, who struck her back on the curbing, causing severe injury to her spine and shoulder. She is also in delicate health, which makes her condition much more serious.

Mr. Galloway fortunately fell astride of the wagon tongue, and having presence of mind, held to the harness and climbed on to the back of one of the horses and succeeded in stopping them after they had run a half mile. Dr. Coulter was near by and went to the lady's assistance, and with Dr. H. B. Forbes cared for her injuries.

FENCED IN STREETS.

Richard Flint, who is very desirous of increasing his land holdings and crops on his place, located near Thirty-fourth street and Woodland avenue, decided to fence in the streets and planted a good watermelon patch and put a chicken run on the street. The neighbors were displeased with his thrift and reported the same to the police. Officer Layne was sent to investigate the report and found that Flint had Thirty-fourth street fenced up in front of his place with the exception of a small driveway, and Woodland avenue with the exception of a footpath. The officer, under instructions from Chief Browning, tore the fences down and again opened up the streets to the public. Flint was much agitated over the action and swore to make the police restore the fences, claiming ownership to the grounds.

SUIT FOR DIVORCE.

On a report of the committee on waterworks the matter permitting S. L. Allred to use his city water on his farm in Lake View was left to the superintendent of waterworks.

The committee on sewer reported recommending that the city join the Smoot Investment company in making arrangements, by cleaning the tail race, to carry off the city sewage. Report adopted.

On recommendation of the committee on license Christian Berresen was permitted to conduct a second-hand store without a license.

The council decided that the committee on waterworks should advertise for bids to put in place continuous wood stave pipe for the waterworks extension. The bid for an ordinance providing for the issuance of \$35,000 4 1/2 per cent 10-20 waterworks bonds, passed its first and second readings and went over till next meeting.

INCREASE IN POSTOFFICE BUSINESS.

The business of the Provo postoffice has increased \$1,888.87 in the fiscal year ended June 30, as compared with 1905, the receipts this year being \$14,683.24.

Assistant Postmaster General Hitchcock has authorized the appointment of another carrier for the Provo postoffice and Andrew Hartley has received the appointment. John Foote has been appointed substitute clerk. W. W. Postmaster clove was in Washington last winter the matter of another carrier was considered and representations made that an additional carrier was necessary when the students are here attending the Brigham Young university, and that during the vacation his services are also needed on account of the carriers taking their vacation at this time.

GARDEN CITY NOTES.

An ordinance has been passed by the board of county commissioners requiring persons or corporations to submit a plan of telegraph, telephone, light, power or other pole lines to be erected in the county for approval and permission, before erecting such line. A fine not to exceed \$200, and the removal of the lines at the cost of the owners may be imposed for violation of the ordinance.

A new church will be built by the Episcopians this summer to cost \$6,000. Three thousand dollars of the amount is to be raised here, and yesterday Mr. L. Siegler had \$2,400 of this amount subscribed before noon.

Robert J. Knight is down from Salt Lake visiting members of the Salt Lake Veterans Volunteer Firemen's association in the interest of the excursion to be given by the veterans to Castella Aug. 3.

Charles Nielsen, the Pleasant Grove man who was implicated in the forgery of a check for \$10,116 to which the name of C. M. Hook of American Fork was forged, was fined \$75 by the justice of the peace at American Fork yesterday, on a charge of petit larceny, and was brought to Provo last night by Sheriff Hickenlooper, who will probably serve 15 days in the county jail.

CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

Working for a Municipal Electric Light Plant.

Special Correspondence.

Provo, July 2.—At the meeting of the city council last evening Councilman Poulton reported the result of the citizens' meeting on the electric light question, which favored the ownership by the city of an electric light plant. Mayor Frisby stated that he believed from statements made to him by prominent citizens that there would be no difficulty in securing the necessary money to build a plant. The matter was referred to the committee on electric light with the mayor added, with the understanding that the question will be given immediate attention and investigations made to determine the most feasible plan to accomplish the work.

Councilman Johnson presented a request from John Saxey and Mrs. Louisa McBride, members of the Republican city committee from the Fifth ward, recommending John P. Van Wagner to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Councilman Snow, and Councilman Johnson moved that Mr. Van Wagner be elected to fill the vacancy. Councilman Giles nominated E. S. Hinckley. Mr. Van Wagner was elected by a vote of 5 to 4, the Republicans voting for Mr. Van Wagner and the Democrats for Mr. Hinckley. Some good-natured discussion was indulged in, and on motion of Mr. Giles the election of Mr. Van

Wagner was made unanimous. Councilman Poulton was appointed temporary chairman of the committee on finance, and the committee instructed to present an estimate of the amount necessary for the municipal expenses for the ensuing year.

Mayor Frisby vetoed the soda water fountain license ordinance on the ground that he believed the people engaged in selling soda water were already paying as much for license provisions as other people in business. Action on the veto was postponed for one week.

Justice Noon reported \$36.40 collected in fines for the quarter ending June 30, and imprisonments for 101 days imposed.

The resignation of Wm. Homer as assistant superintendent of waterworks was presented and accepted.

Ball Commissioner Henry presented quarterly report, showing \$88.50 forfeit.

Sexton Wade presented his quarterly report showing receipts \$374.25 and delinquent \$128.40.

The committee on waterworks recommended that the county be permitted to construct a road over the city's pipe line right of way in Provo canyon. Report adopted. The same committee reported that the Blue Cliff canal had been repaired to the satisfaction of the company.

A question was read from Senator Smoot to Mayor Frisby, under date of June 27, asking whether the city council favored the creation of a forest reserve of Provo canyon, as the senator desired to take the matter up before
