

## REMARKABLE FEAT IN CHILD SURGERY

Infant in Dying Condition is  
Saved by Infusion of  
Father's Blood.

OCCASIONS MUCH COMMENT.

First Case on Record Where Patient  
So Young Has Been Successfully  
Undergone Such Treatment.

New York, arch 20.—An operation involving the transfusion of blood into the veins of a child 5 days old, performed by Dr. Alexis Carroll, head of the Rockefeller institute, has created wide attention among physicians and surgeons. The child was suffering from purpura, a little known disease, one of whose symptoms is a weakening of the walls of the arteries so that the blood escapes from all parts of the body. When Dr. Carroll was called into the case he gave it as his opinion that the transfusion of blood offered the only hope of saving the tiny patient. The child's father, Dr. Adrian V. S. Lambert, volunteered to give all of his own blood that was necessary and one of his arteries was connected with the baby's blood vessels. The effect was almost instantaneously beneficial and the little one is now not only out of all danger, but rapidly gaining flesh. This is said to be the first case on record in which so young a patient has been successfully treated for purpura by this method—the only method known by which it can be combated and to employ which in the case of a tiny infant was commented upon by members of the medical profession yesterday as an exceptionally daring feat.

## GERMAN TROOPERS MEET HOTTENTOTS

On Burning Lands of Kalahari  
Desert they Search for  
Hostile Chief.

Berlin, March 19.—The government tonight published a cablegram from South Africa reporting a battle between the German expeditionary forces and a body of Hottentots in the Kalahari desert. The German troops had been sent out to find Simon Koppers, the last of the Hottentot chiefs, who is still hostile. The engagement was a very severe one. The enemy lost 58 killed. Seven men and several women were captured. The German force left Cochoas on March 5, 430 strong, with four machine guns and 700 camels. They made forced marches into the waterless desert for four days before stopping long enough to cook a fresh supply of food.

The only water found was a dirty pool, which was insufficient to quench the thirst of the camels.

Capt. Eberhart finally located the Hottentot camp on March 15. He began the attack next morning at daybreak and soon there was fierce fighting all along the line. The German commander fell in the first onslaught and the second officer in command took charge of the expeditionary forces, which drove the Hottentots from one position to another, until finally they broke and fled in all directions. Chief Koppers' power has been badly weakened by this defeat, but it will be necessary for the Germans to continue a vigilant watch over the approaches to the desert.

WENT IN SPECULATION

Port Huron, Mich., March 19.—Attorneys for the United Home Protector Fraternity of this city, a building and loan company with banking features, made announcement this afternoon that supreme Secy. W. L. Wilson last night confessed that he had misused \$75,000 of the funds of the institution. Bank- ing Commissioner Zimmerman has taken charge of the institution. He made the following statement this afternoon to the Associated Press:

"Supreme Secy. W. L. Wilson of the United Home Protector Fraternity, conducting a building and loan business here, is short an amount which will probably be in excess of \$75,000. The money was lost in speculation, in mining ventures and the promotion of electric railroads. They were covered up during that period by falsifying the records of the company. For instance, a mortgage would be paid to the company and instead of recording it as paid, Wilson would carry it on the books and pay the interest himself as it became due. In a recent examination I found that Secy. Wilson had been juggling his accounts in one of the banks here. I ordered the supreme trustees to investigate the matter further, and they did so. Last night they called Secy. Wilson before them and taxed him with the shortage, and he confessed. He is under surveillance."

## ANDRE TARDIEU PRAISES TEDDY

French Journalist Becomes Ebu-  
lient When He Pens Eulogy  
Of Roosevelt.

Paris, March 19.—The Temps today publishes an article on President Roosevelt from the pen of Andre Tardieu, its foreign representative, who has just returned from America. After picturing the president's youthful vigor and his love for the struggles against wrong, M. Tardieu quotes from the president's utterances to him, especially in connection with his crusade. The president declared his struggle against plutocracy was because he was an enemy of socialism and an enemy of the plutocrat.

"I am after my fashion a conservative," M. Tardieu quotes Roosevelt as saying, "and for this combat the abuses of plutocracy. I know the abuses in Wall street and I know the plutocrat, but it is because I speak the language of truth to the American people that I think I am a good patriot. I am not a sentimentalist. Let them attack me; I will defend myself by appealing to the spirit of justice in the country. I will not return the blows."

Continuing, Mr. Roosevelt said he thought that what the United States lacked most was a comprehension of the fact that she has interests throughout the entire world.

"I wish all Americans," the president said, "would feel that American politics is world politics; that we are and will be concerned in all the great world questions."

Mr. Roosevelt then spoke with enthusiasm of the battleship fleet which he said would go to Hawaii, probably to Australia and then through the Suez canal to Europe. He had ordered the fleet to make this voyage, first, because he wished to demonstrate to the American people that the navy was effective and important, that they should be interested in and proud of it, and secondly, because he desired to show to the other powers the naval force of the United States. The president declared that without doubt the United States would eventually have two fleets, but in the meantime the present one would be divided.

"We say," M. Tardieu quotes Mr. Roosevelt as remarking, "speak softly and carry the 'big stick'; this is a good policy in international troubles, and it is good also in foreign politics."

TRANSMAL MINE OUTPUT.

Washington, March 20.—The gold mine of the Transmal produced in 1907, \$138,750,000 worth of gold, which, with the exception of \$5,000,000, was obtained along the reef upon which is situated the city of Johannesburg. This information, which comes to the state department from the U. S. consul at Victoria, South Africa, added that prospecting and new mining enterprises outside of Johannesburg districts have yielded practically no result.

SENATOR BRYAN ILL.

Washington, March 20.—Serious apprehension is felt concerning Senator Bryan of Florida, who is ill at Providence hospital in this city, with typhoid fever. Dr. L. E. Barker of Johns Hopkins hospital called into consultation today, did not attempt to conceal his opinion that the case was a critical one, because of the danger that blood poisoning might supervene.

Mr. Bryan's wife and brother are in constant attendance.

BIRCH FOUND GUILTY.

Helena, Mont., March 20.—Ball Birch, a well known Custer county ranchman, was today convicted in the federal court on the charge of unlawfully fencing of the public domain, and sentence will be pronounced tomorrow. Judge Hunt also overruled the motion in arrest of judgment in the case of E. Cardwell, convicted last week on a similar charge.

The case will be taken to higher courts for final determination.

UTAH MEN TO GET MONEY.

(Special to the "News.") Washington, March 20.—The omnibus claims bill, which came up for consideration in the senate this afternoon, contains an item appropriating \$198,875 to reimburse George W. Young, postmaster at Wanship, Utah, for postage stamps stolen from him, also an item appropriating \$1,407 to reimburse A. A. Nason of Provo for expenses incurred in extracting Gilsonite from lands within the Uncompaghe reservation under locations made in good faith.

Washington, March 20.—The Japanese government has extended an invitation to the American government to have the Atlantic battleship fleet visit any port in Japan on its homeward cruise around the world. This invitation was received at the Japanese embassy here yesterday and was at once transmitted to Secy. Root by Ambassador Takahira. The question of its acceptance or denial will be considered by the president and his cabinet today.

Chicago, March 20.—Emma Goldman, an anarchist, suffered a nervous collapse last night and was taken to the home of a physician. Her sudden collapse was attributed to her strenuous efforts during the last few days to secure a hall in which to speak in defiance of the police.

ALIENS WANT TO GO BACK.

Denver, Colo., March 20.—Pinched by hunger and unable to earn money with which to relieve their wants, 200 Bulgarians yesterday sent in petition to Gov. Buchtel asking him to use his influence toward getting them employment, or to send them back to their European homes.

JAPS WANT TO UNIONIZE.

Seattle, Wash., March 20.—M. Salto, former member of the Japanese cabinet as minister of commerce, arrived here from Tokyo yesterday. His errand covers a campaign among union labor leaders for admission of Japanese workmen to membership in organized labor bodies.
