The House passed a resolution calling upon Stanton for all copies of correspondence between him and the President in relation to limitation of powers, as the Secretary of War stated that the charges against Judge Field grew out of a private conversation with Senator Stewart, in which Field stated that he was opposed to impartial negro suffrage at present; he also thought a more conservative tendency on the part of the Government would be beneficial. It is stated that Seward hopes to induce Minister Adams to withdraw his resignation. John Devine was vesterday found guilty of defrauding the Government of \$600,000 through his operations in his whisky distillery.

Dates from England of the 22d ult. give accounts of some important Fenian arrests, and seizures of large quantities of ammunition, etc.

Gibraltar.-The Capt. and two sailors of the crew of the schooner Moses Waring, which foundered at sea, were rescued on the 18th by the bark Minnie Gordon, and brought to this port. They had been seven days without food, and to sustain life were obliged to resort to the flesh of the mate who died from exhaustion. When picked up, the men were hardly able to do more than speak, but they are now recovering.

San Francisco, 4 .- Work on the Central Pacific railroad east of the Sierra Nevada mountains, is progressing rapidly: the weather is favorable for grading, two 'sections are nearly completed and ready for the rails. A new forty ton locomotive has been safely transported across the Summit and there is sufficient, motive power and material east of the Sierra to complete the contemplated 100 miles of the track by the time the connection is made with the Summit.

Late Acapulco advices state that Gen. Alvarez had called for the elections of the President of the Republic, Members of Congress and Judges of the Supreme Court in Guerrero, that State not having participated in the late general election: the lists being held by the revolutionists under Juarez explained the call issued by Alvarez. Juarez declines to accept the resignation of Jose Godoy, the Con-sul of the Republic at San Francisco. It is reported that the Government has renewed the charter granted by Maximili-an to Holladay for the Mexican coast line of steamships. All who spoke expressed themselves unqualifiedly in favor of the Deseret Alphabet, which was adopted; and a motion was made to take the necessary measures to in-troduce it in printed works, which passed un-animously. A committee was also appointed to petition the Legislature for an appropriation for educational purposes, to be expended under the direction of the Chance or and Board of Begents.

There is no doubt but when the characters of the Deseret Alphabet get into general use, the obtaining of knowledge will be greatly facilitat-ed; and our young people will be able to acquire knowledge rapidly and with great ease, com-pared with the time occupied and the difficullies to be encountered under the present mode. It now takes years for a child to learn to read; and, indeed, there are very few grown men, even of those who devote themselves to literary pursuits, who can always use our present sys-tem of orthography correctly, it requires so great an effort of memory to recollect how words are spelled. But with the introduction of the Deseret Alphabet all this would be removed. There would be no silent letters, but every word would be spelt according to its sound; and the almost illiterate man could spell as correct-ly as the best educated.
