

## BUTTE SITUATION IS VERY SERIOUS.

Judge Clancy Will Do What He Can to Expedite the Appeal From His Decision.

### POLICEMEN GUARD HIS HOME.

Armed Men Were Around the Depot Evidently with the Intention of Preventing His Departure.

Butte, Mont., Oct. 25.—The most important development in the copper situation today was the fact that Judge William Clancy decided to forego his intention of shooting elk while thousands of idle miners are looking to him for whatever relief is possible. Judge Clancy today stated that he would not leave the city and will do all he can to expedite the appeal from his decision to the supreme court.

A local committee of the miners' union waited upon the judge this afternoon and had a long consultation with him on the subject of postponing his hunting trip. The judge had already informed Mayor Mullins that he had decided to give up the trip. The fact that a number of armed men were around the depot last night when it was reported the judge intended leaving the city, caused the mayor to take extra precautions looking to the personal protection of Judge Clancy.

Every corner of the city is being guarded and a number of special policemen have already been impressed into service. All Saturday night four policemen guarded the home of Judge Clancy and two the home of Judge H. H. Toole. Mayor Mullins said today that he would employ 500 special policemen if he found the situation warranted it. While there have been no unusual demonstrations the mayor says he will take every precaution to prevent anything that might incite riot or disorder.

Smoke is still issuing from the Colorado and Washoe smelters, but it is stated that fires would probably be withdrawn in both plants tonight or tomorrow. The engineers and pumpmen are still being employed in keeping the mines drained of water.

The city tonight, though thronged with idle crowds, is quiet, the announcement of Judge Clancy's abandonment of the hunting trip apparently having exercised a soothing influence. Indignation is still rife over the departure from the city of John MacGinniss.

Late last night an effigy of Judge Clancy was discovered hanging in one of the principal streets of Great Falls, where the big electrolytic smelter of the Boston & Montana company are located. The perpetrators of the deed are unknown to the police.

Last evening telegrams were sent from Great Falls to Senator W. A. Clark in this city, Gov. J. K. Toole at Helena and Representative Joseph Dixon at Washington and J. J. Hill, president of the Great Northern asking each of them if they would act with the other gentlemen named in an effort to mediate between the warring copper companies of this state, other members to be Senator Gibson, Gov. Toole, Congressman Dixon and president of the Great Northern company, in an endeavor to open mines and smelters of the Amalgamated company in Montana.

Before taking any steps in the matter Senator Gibson was consulted. He approved the plan and said he would be only too happy to do anything that he could in the matter.

Late last night Senator Clark was heard from by the following telegram:

act with the gentlemen named and see what may be done.

The thought of the citizens who initiated this plan was that this committee could act between the parties to the copper war and the courts in any way that they might think best as soon as they could consult with each other.

From President J. J. Hill of the Great Northern the following message was received tonight:

"St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 25.—To Herbert Strain, President Business Men's Association, Great Falls: Message received. Would be very much pleased to assist, but there must be some indication of willingness on the part of the disputants or efforts in the direction proposed will accomplish nothing. (Signed) "JAMES J. "St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 25.—United States Senator Paris Gibson, Great Falls: Message received. Have received message from Herbert Strain and can only add that if I can be of any assistance I shall be only too glad to do everything in my power to relieve situation. (Signed) "JAMES J. HILL."

A telegram was also received from Gov. J. K. Toole, signifying his intention of joining in efforts to effect peace between warring copper interests.

HEINZE'S STATEMENT. F. Augustus Heinze in a statement to the public today says that the offer of

the Butte Miners' union of \$500 a share for the MacGinniss stock in the B. & M. company is just half of what Mr. MacGinniss was offered for his stock about a year ago. Mr. Heinze's statement has caused a mild sensation, as the best price that Boston & Montana can command at the present time, according to indisputable authority, is \$125.

A report received in this city tonight says that John MacGinniss has been seen in Salt Lake.

Tonight a meeting of the executive committee of the Butte Miners' union is being held behind closed doors.

The officials of the Miners' union refuse to divulge the proceedings of the executive session held tonight. It was announced that Judge Clancy has promised the committee of miners to remain in Butte six days or longer if necessary in order that appeals to the supreme court might be perfected.

By practically a unanimous vote the Silver Bow Trades and Labor assembly endorsed the action of the Miners' union last Saturday afternoon, both as to the offer to buy the MacGinniss stock in the Boston & Montana company and the resolutions adopted.

The assembly meeting was largely attended, nearly every union in the city being present.

The assembly also decided to hold a public mass meeting some time this week, if in the meantime a settlement of the controversy between the Amalgamated company and the Heinze people is not effected.

The committee was appointed to arrange for the meeting consisting of a representative of each of the Butte unions.

### AN UNEXPECTED MOVE.

Miners' Union Offers to Buy John MacGinniss' Stock.

Butte, Mont., Oct. 24.—An unexpected move was made in the Amalgamated Copper situation today when a proposition was made by the Miners' union to the John MacGinniss, vice president of the United Copper company, and his associates connected with the Montana Ore Purchasing company to purchase their stock in the Boston & Montana company. The union would then dismiss the proceedings against the Boston & Montana and Montana company to the end there would be a general resumption of the Amalgamated mines.

At a special meeting of the union, at which about 2,000 miners attended, it was decided to offer MacGinniss and Forester \$500 a share for their shares of the Boston & Montana stock. A similar offer was made for the hundred shares of stock the MacGinniss and Tamm hold in the Parrott Copper and Silver Mining company at a rate not to exceed \$100 a share.

United States Senator W. A. Clark, A. J. Davis, acting in behalf of the First National bank, and John D. Ryan, president of the Daily Bank and Trust company, joined in a communication to the Miners' union under date of Oct. 24, offering to furnish the organization sufficient money to purchase the stock at the figures stated.

They agreed to hold the stock only as security for the money advanced, and will not ask the union to pay any deficiency arising from the sale of the stock or any interest on the money invested.

Members of the Miners' union figure that the purchase of the MacGinniss-Forester-Tamm stock will immediately set at rest all talk of a shutdown for an indefinite period. The shares they hold in the two companies were the cause of the general suspension of work in the Amalgamated mine. Judge Clancy's injunction order having the effect of preventing the latter company from voting their stock of the Boston & Montana company and the Parrott company.

At the close of the meeting a committee, consisting of Ed Long, president of the union; Daniel Donevan, secretary; John Shea, financial secretary; P. J. Nugent and Jerry O'Neill proceeded at once to lay the proposition before Mr. MacGinniss. He could not, however, be located, and though diligent inquiry was made at his house and his office, his whereabouts up to a late hour tonight could not be ascertained.

During the afternoon a circular was distributed on the streets and among the miners attending the meeting, telling of a move being made in Colorado to throw 20,000 men out of work. No one out here holding cards in the Miners' union was permitted to enter the hall. What transpired at the meeting was only known to members of the organization, as the session was a secret one, except what information was given out after adjournment. The first matter to come before the meeting was the proposition of Senator Clark and the local banks to furnish money for the

purchase of the MacGinniss stock. The offer was accepted with little or no opposition.

A resolution was passed suggesting the need of adequate legal aid to meet emergencies such as now confront the people of Butte and the entire state. Reference is also made in the resolution to the judicial officers of Silver Bow county, whom the resolution accuses of bias and prejudice in favor of one of the principal parties to numerous suits involving millions of dollars.

In conclusion, the union calls upon Gov. Toole to convene an extraordinary session of the legislature for the purpose of enacting legislation that will correct the evils mentioned as well as for the purpose of trying and impeaching any public officer in the state who may be proven guilty of malfeasance in office.

The resolution that created the sensation of the day and which was adopted without a dissenting vote, was the one objecting to the establishment of free soup kitchens for the benefit of the idle miners, as was suggested by the Amalgamated attorneys that his return to the city depended largely on his success attending his efforts to kill a bull elk and a few rabbits in the face of the present situation. The meeting was orderly throughout.

MacGinniss and Forester bought their stock in the Boston & Montana and Parrott companies three years ago, the Boston & Montana shares costing \$115 each. At the present time though not listed the same stock commands in the neighborhood of \$135. Their holdings constitute one-fifth of 1 percent of the whole.

F. Augustus Heinze refuses to make any expression as to the offer of the Miners' union at the present time, though he said he might later in the night, if he could locate MacGinniss, say something on the matter.

### CANADA STILL ALARMED.

Fears the United States Now Wants Greenland.

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 24.—Replying to a reference made in the Canadian house of commons by Senator Pierce of New Brunswick to the possibility of the United States obtaining possession of Greenland to the detriment of Canadian interests, the Halifax Chronicle, the newspaper supporter of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in Nova Scotia, advocates the purchase of the islands by Canada. The Chronicle says:

"Unless prompt action is taken we shall have to give up our claims in the morning to find that our neighbors have encompassed us on the east also, and that we have another 'arbitration' to face. At least, if we cannot secure Greenland by purchase for Canada let us have some definite imperial pronouncement with reference to it, analogous to the Monroe doctrine.

"The other half of this continent is by choice and by right British. The Americans bought land on our north-west solely for the purpose of annoying us and lessening the value of our country. They are quite capable of unchecked pursuit of a similar policy in the east. Now is the time to take action or at least to speak out a plain warning."

### GOVERNMENT VS. RAILROAD.

Uncle Sam and Great Northern Lock Horns Over Reservoir Site.

Great Falls, Mont., Oct. 25.—The United States government and the Great Northern railroad company have joined issues and the government has made the first move. News was received today from Wolfpoint, on the Port Peck Indian reservation, that the Indians there, it is alleged, in the direction of the agent, had removed a dam and let all the water run out of the railroad company's reservoir at point.

The reservoir, constructed at a cost of about \$40,000, is one of the largest and most important owned by the Great Northern railroad. The company several years ago constructed a reservoir and appropriated water from Wolf creek, and for several seasons recently the Indians have complained of a short supply of water for irrigation. In order to correct the asserted rights of the Indians and to give ground for a suit at law, the department, it is said, ordered the emptying of the reservoir, and in accordance with instructions a force of Indians was detailed to cut the dam and release the water that was stored. This was done, and if the railroad company should wish to retain the reservoir it must speedily bring a suit against the government.

### Cost of New York's Election.

New York, Oct. 26.—An estimate made by a member of the board of elections fixes the cost of the coming election in this city at \$800,000, to which is to be added \$130,000 that was spent in the recent primary elections.

In order to give voters a chance to express their desire as to candidates, 2,764,800 ballots have been printed, which include the names of all the candidates on the ballot, and 307,000 sample ballots, which are to be used to explain to voters how a legal vote should be cast.

### Will Bring Reisinger's Body.

San Diego, Cal., Oct. 26.—The United States training ship Mohican, just arrived on a cruise which will be extended as far south as the United States coasting station at Pochilliqua bay, has orders from Washington, accompanied by a permit from the City of Mexico, to take up the remains of Capt. W. W. Reisinger and bring them to San Diego, whence they will be shipped to Washington.

Capt. Reisinger, while captain of the Philadelphia, died on board when the cruiser was at Magdalena bay on her way from Panama to this port. Under the Mexican law the body had to be buried there and could not be removed for two years. This period will have elapsed since the death and burial when the Mohican is at Magdalena bay on
