AN UNEXPECTED MOVE.

Miners' Union Offers to Buy John MacGinniss' Stock.

Butte, Mont., Oct. 24.-An unexpect-ed move was made in the Amalgamated ed move was made in the Amalgamated Copper situation today when a prope-sition was made by the Miners' union to John MacGinniss, vice president of the United Copper company, and his associates cot cted with the Montana Ore Purchasing company to purchase their stock in the Boston & Montana company. The union would then dis-miss the proceedings against the Bos-ton & Jontana and Montana company to the ead there would be a general re-sumption of the Amalgamated mines, smelters and various othher plants throughout the state of Montana. At a social meeting of the union, at

about 3,000 miners attend-vas decided to offer Mac-aud Forester \$500 a share for shares of the Boston t stock. A similar offer was & Mo

& Mon t stock, A similar offer was made for the hundred shares of stock MacGinniss and Tamm hold in the Par-rott Copper and Silver Mining company at a rate not to exceed \$100 a share. United States Senator W. A. Clark, A. J. Davis, acting in behalf of the First National bank, and John D. Ryan, president of the Daly Bank and Trust company, joined in a commu-nication to the Miners' union under date of Oct, 24, offering to furnish the organization sufficient money to pur-chase the stock at the figures stated. They agreed to hold the stock only

They agreed to hold the stock only as security for the money advanced, and will not ask the union to pay any deficiency arising from the sale of the stock or any interest on the money in-

stock of any interest on the honey he vested. Members of the Miners' union figure that the purchase of the MacGinniss-Forester-Tamm stick will immediately set at rest all talk of a shutdown for an indefinite period. The shares they hold in the two companies were the cause of the general suspension of work in the Amalgamated mine Judge Clanin the Amalgamated mine, Judge Clan-cy's injunction order having the effect of preventing the latter company from voting their stock of the Boston & Mon-tana company and the Parrott com-

pany. At the close of the meeting a com-mittee, consisting of Ed Long, presi-dent of the union: Daniel Donevan, secretary; John Shea, financial secre-tary; P. J. Nugent and Jerry O'Neill proceeded at once to lay the proposi-tion before Mr. MacGinniss. He could not, however, be located, and though

position. A resolution was passed auggesting the need of adequate laws to meet emergencies such as now confront the people of Butte and the entire state. Reference is also made in the resolu-tion to the judicial officers of Silver Bow county, whom the resolution ac-cuses of bias and prejudice in favor of one of the principal parties to numer-ous suits involving millions of dollars. The conclusion, the union calls upon Gov.
