## TRIBUNE SLANDER REFUTED. Sectarian School Teacher Brutally As-

saults 9-Year-Old Boy. Special Correspondence.

The justice tripped and examined the boy and found his back covered with bine and yellow marks, effects of the pun-ishment, which was a very brutial assaud. under a misapprehension owing to no preparation being made for such sea-sons as the last two have been. A warrant charging Miss Taylor with as-sault and battery was itsued and on her arrival in court she was advised to get an attorney to plead her case, Messages were sent to Logan in quest of one, out none were at her disposal. The justice in-formed her that her case could be con-tinued and suggested where she probably could get bonosmen pending the continu-ance of the same, but, upon learning that the fine and cost would be but \$7.89, she pleaded guilty and paid the amount. She may congratuate herself on getting off so easily as the assault upon the child was most cruel. Had she been a teacher in the public schools she would have been instantly dismissed from her position. On the day that she whipped the boy she sent a messenger to a neighbor to borrow a rawhide whip, and faling to get that the messenger found a \$4-inch long butt end of a loaded whip by which the punishment was performed. Neighbors who were attracted by the poor boy's screaming, describe the assault as a very outrageous one, and when the Tribune gives its production the title of "A Shameful Case." It describes the case properly, though not in the sense in-tended. The article in question also says that dry years come and that kind of hus-bandry has been practised, crop fail-ure is the inevitable result. Men who have farmed in Utah for years and farmed properly will come into this country and throw all their former practises away, expecting enormous crops by merely scratching the land,

Her statement would indicate that she knew this boy, and if it he true that he did such a thing intentionally, why didn't she complain to the city officers, that proper punishment could be administered, and she is protected? something she has not done.
