HORSESHOERS OPTIMISTIC.

Report Favorable Progress in Strike Settlement—Referendum Vote.

At last night's meeting of the arbitration committee of the Salt Lake Federation of labor, the horseshoers reported progress toward ending the strike, as the bosses had made concessions. However, they would not recognize the union, something that was much desired by the strikers and the horseshoers would like the Federation to exercise its good offices in bringing about a change of heart. The committee is meeting again this afternoon, to consider the situation.

President W. R. Ramsey of the local division of Electric Workers for Utah, Idaho, Wyoming and Montana, appeared before the Federation, to deny that the Montana strike against the Bell Telephone company was ended. Ramsey reported a referendum vote now being taken, would show the strike will be continued, any story to the contrary notwithstanding.

The chairmakers sent word of the establishment of a non-union factory, and urged that the sale of its goods be discouraged. "Through every fair means." Various other unions urged the purchase of union-made goods only. The legislative committee reported its belief that the city council would act favorably on the proposed ordinance requiring standard wiring in buildings.

HUSBAND IS INDIFFERENT.

William J. Craig is Charged With Having Treated His Wife Coldly.

Henrietta M. Craig has filed suit against her husband, William J. Craig, in which she seeks to be released from the bonds of matrimony existing between the two. Mrs. Craig complains that her husband has been neglecting her for a long time, persistently refused to accompany her to social gatherings, or notice her, or speak to her, and has treated her with indifference and coldness. She also asserts that Mr. Craig has an ungovernable temper and time has been when he was not at home in his presence. She accuses him of calling her vile and indecent names, charging her with infidelity and threatening to strike her, much to her mental distress and anguish. Plaintiff alleges that defendant is a mining man with extensive interests in Nevada, and an income of between \$1,500 and \$2,000 per month. She asks for \$500 attorney's fees, \$200 per month temporary alimony until the case is tried and suitable permanent alimony afterward, and costs. Plaintiff also asks that defendant be restrained from disposing of his property pending the outcome of the action. The couple were married Nov. 27, 1891.

FIRST PRESIDENT WILL BE THERE

Prof. Jeremiah W. Sanborn, Formerly of the Agricultural College, Coming.

COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES.

Members of the Alumni Association Expect to Greet Him at the Institution Next Week.

Friends of the Agricultural college will no doubt be glad to learn that at the commencement exercises, which are to be held May 31, June 1 and 2, this year, Prof. Jeremiah W. Sanborn, who

was the first president of the college, will be present and deliver the address to the graduates. The services will begin Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, the baccalaureate sermon to be delivered by Rev. L. Morris, president of the Salt Lake stake. On Monday evening at 8 o'clock the session is to be devoted to historical reminiscences. There are to be a number of short speeches giving the early history of the college. The graduating class will furnish music and entertainment. On Tuesday the commencement exercises are to be held, at which President Sanborn will give the address to the graduates. The annual banquet and ball of the alumni association will be held Tuesday evening.

WORK IN UTAH.

President Sanborn's work in Utah will be remembered by Utah citizens, especially in the farming communities, with a great deal of pride and pleasure. President Sanborn came here at the invitation of the first board of trustees, and immediately began the task of organizing the college faculty, the experiment station staff, and placing the grounds in shape, constructing buildings, etc. He was a man of considerable energy and foresight, and for his labors during those years, the citizens of Utah owe him a debt of gratitude. He was connected with the institution from 1888 to 1894, at which time the first class was graduated from the college.

While in Utah President Sanborn's work as director of the experiment station, attracted the attention of men engaged in scientific agriculture, and it is said that he has met with great success in adopting scientific methods to the practical problems involved in reclaiming the barren New England hillsides.

Dr. Wilton, the present president of the college was in the city today and to a "News" representative had stated that the year just closing had been the most successful one. The total registration for the year was 882, the largest in the history of the college and this notwithstanding the fact that Idaho students were required to pay a tuition by enactment of the last legislature.

The college catalogue has been published and during the week was distributed to the students.

REDUCED RATES ON SEWERS.

Cheaper Labor and Material Reduces Cost of Extension 170.

At a meeting of the board of public works, held last night, three contracts were let for sewer extensions. Davis & Heuser secured extension No. 170.

while James Kennedy will complete Nos. 192 and 194.

No. 170 is the one that caused so much trouble some time ago. Davis & Heuser were the successful bidders at that time, but threw up the contract and forfeited a certified check for \$100. When the contract was about to be turned over to Strange & McGuire, it was ascertained that the matter had not been properly advertised, and all negotiations were called off. The late bids were lower all around. A fact accounted for by the contractors because of the cheaper material and labor to be obtained at the present time. The extensions are described as follows:

No. 192—Second North from West Temple to Second North; Second North from First North to Third North; Second North from First North to Second North; Third North from First North to Second North; about 4,100 feet.

No. 194—Third South from First to Second West; Fourth South from First to Second West; First West from Second West to Third West; Second West from Second West to Third West; Second West from Fourth to Fifth South; about 4,300 feet.
