FIGHT BETWEENTHE UNITED STATES TROOPS AND THE CAMANCHES .- Last night news was received from Fort Arbuckle by Captain A. Montgomery, Quartermaster at the post near this place, by a letter from Lieutenant Powel, First infantry, and Quartermaster at Fort Arbuckle, giving an account of a battle between a detachment of the Second cavalry United States army and the Camanches, in which Lieutenant Van Camp and four men were killed, and Major Van Dorn wounded, one man missing and ten wounded. Forty of the Camanches were found dead on the field, and it is not known how many are wounded.

The information is official and can be relied on; and we are indebted to the politeness of Captain Montgomery for it, and we will hasten to lay it before the public at once, in an extra. FORT ARBUCKLE, C.N., Oct. 2, 1858.

Major Van Dorn attacked the Camanches yesterday morning, near the Witchita village; his express arrived here about two or three hours ago. The action was sharp. Lieutenant Van Camp is killed, Major Van Dorn is severely wounded, four men dead, one man missing (hospital steward), ten men wounded. About forty Camanches killed.

By command of Captain Prince I have just hired and sent out a wagon and an ambulance, three years old. accompanied by Assistant Surgeon Gaenslen and an escort of twenty men, to carry out provisions and bring in the wounded.

The whole command (cavalry) is coming in here.


