

FIGHT BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES TROOPS AND THE CAMANCHES.—Last night news was received from Fort Arbuckle by Captain A. Montgomery, Quartermaster at the post near this place, by a letter from Lieutenant Powell, First Infantry, and Quartermaster at Fort Arbuckle, giving an account of a battle between a detachment of the Second Cavalry United States Army and the Camanches, in which Lieutenant Van Camp and four men were killed, and Major Van Dorn wounded, one man missing and ten wounded. Forty of the Camanches were found dead on the field, and it is not known how many are wounded.

The information is official and can be relied on; and we are indebted to the politeness of Captain Montgomery for it, and we will hasten to lay it before the public at once, in an extra.

FORT ARBUCKLE, C.N., Oct. 2, 1858.
Sir,—Will you be so kind as to forward immediately four wagons loaded with flour and pork, or bacon, in preference, if you have it on hand.

Perhaps by this time you have heard from department headquarters in reference to my requisition, forwarded some time ago; if not, please send the articles wanted, in anticipation of requisition, as they are greatly needed here, in consequence of Major Van Dorn's command being near this post and drawing their supplies from it.

Major Van Dorn attacked the Camanches yesterday morning, near the Wichita village; his express arrived here about two or three hours ago. The action was sharp. Lieutenant Van Camp is killed, Major Van Dorn is severely wounded, four men dead, one man missing (hospital steward), ten men wounded. About forty Camanches killed.

By command of Captain Prince I have just hired and sent out a wagon and an ambulance, accompanied by Assistant Surgeon Gaenslen and an escort of twenty men, to carry out provisions and bring in the wounded.

The whole command (cavalry) is coming in here.

TERRIBLE HURRICANE IN ILLINOIS.—On Wednesday evening last a portion of the county was traversed by a hurricane, the most severe that has visited us for many years. The most serious effects were experienced near the village of Time, almost eight miles southwest of this place. Many of our readers will remember a large brick house, some half-mile west of the village, on the Atlas road, known as the Howland House. That house is now a heap of ruins, having been blown over by the storm, three persons instantly killed, and several others badly injured. We have learned no details of the catastrophe.—[Pittsfield (Ill.) Democrat, Oct. 13.]

THE INK OF THE ANCIENTS.—In a letter from Mr. Joseph Ellis, of Brighton, addressed to the Society of Arts' Journal, he states, that by making a solution of shellac with borax, in water, and adding a suitable proportion of pure lampblack, an ink is producible which is indelible by time or by chemical agents, and which, on drying, will present a polished surface, as with the ink found on the Egyptian papyrus. He made ink in the way described, and proved, if not its identity with that of ancient Egypt, yet the correctness of the formula which was given him by the late Mr. Charles Hatchett, F.R.S.—[Chamber's Edinburgh Journal.]
