Fri. 1.--The Ogden "Liberal" city council made an effort to steal the Tabernacle square.--Primier William E. Gladstone, delivered a powerful speech in favor of Irish home rule in the House of Commons, London, England.

Sat. 2.--In the Third District Court, Salt Lake City, George Manwaring, of Salt Lake City, was sentenced to four months' imprisonment, and Joseph Carlisle, of Mill Creek, to 85 days and \$100 and costs, both for unl. coh.--Hans P. Nielsen, and Niels Nielsen released from the Utah Pen.--Elder Hosea Stout died in Big Cottonwood, Salt Lake Co.--The Utah Supreme Court rendered a decision, fixing the compensation of Receiver Dyer and his attorneys, amounting to \$27,365.63 for one year's service.

Sun. 3.--After a lengthy trial in the Third District Court, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of Ross McMannay, who killed Charles Stokes Gilman Sept. 1, 1888.--Samuel W. Woolley released from the Utah Pen.

Mon. 4.--In the First District Court, at Provo, H. W. Sanderson, of Fairview, Sanpete Co., was sentenced to 85 days' imprisonment and \$100 fine and costs, and Joseph B. Reynolds and August Svendsen, to 75 days and \$50 fine and costs, each, and Mads Jensen to pay a fine of \$50, all for unl. coh.--Hans J. Petersen, of Smithfield, Charles Bailey, of Wellsville, and Willard Hansen, of Brigham City, released from the Utah Pen.--Benjamin Harrison inaugurated President of the United States.

Fri. 8.--Andrew Amundsen released from the Utah Pen.--James L. Moyer suicided in Ogden by taking poison.--Captain John Ericsson, engineer and inventor of the Monitor, died in New York, aged 86 years.

Sat. 9.--In the First District Court at Provo, Jacob Hafen was sentenced to 85 days' imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$50

and costs, and Thomas Cloward to 50 days and costs, for unl. coh.--A. McKinnon, of Randolph, and James Miller, jun., released from the Utah Pen.--Frank H. Dyer wrote a letter to President Harrison, tendering his resignation as U. S. marshal for Utah.

Mon. 11.--Six thousand weavers went on a strike at Fall River, Mass.

Sat. 16.--Ole P. Borg, of Richfield, released from the Utah Pen.--During a terrific hurricane at Apha, Samoa Islands, the American men-of-war *Trenton* and *Vandalia* were totally wrecked, and the *Nipsic* disabled, and the German men-of-war *Adler*, *Oiga* and *Eber* were driven on the reef and wrecked. Of the American crews four officers and 47 men were drowned, and of the German five officers and 87 men lost their lives.

Tu. 19.--Judge Phillip H. Emerson died in Ogden.--Bishop Thomas R. Cutler, of Lehi, liberated from the Utah Pen.

Wed. 20.--Sidney R. Carter, of Sevier County, released from the Utah Pen.--Thos. J. Anderson, the newly appointed associate judge for Utah, arrived in Salt Lake City.

Thurs. 21.--In the First District Court, at Ogden, George Facer, of Brigham City, was sentenced to four months' imprisonment and \$50 fine and costs, for unl. coh.--Bishop H. H. Dalrymple, of Preston, Bear Lake Co., Idaho, released from the Boise City penitentiary, where he had been imprisoned for conscience sake.
