Man Who Shot Atty. Heney Ends His Career by Committing Suicide.

CASE CAUSES MUCH COMMENT

Police Trying to Ascertain How He Concealed Pistol-San Francisco's Civic Pride is Aroused.

San Francisco, Nov. 14 .- Morris Hans, who yesterday attempted to assass! nate Francis J. Heney, tonight cominitied suicide by shooting himself through the middle of his forchead with a pistol he had concealed about his person. Haas went to bed at a o'clock at the county jail and covered up his face with a blanket. At 8:40 a shot was heard from his cell, and when the guard, entered it was found that he had rolled out of bed and was lying dead on the floor, with a bullet hole in his forehead. A 41 caliber single shot deringer was grasped in his haad. His left trouser leg was pulled up, and ex-amination showed a mark on his leg where the weapon had rested while concealed in his left leg. "Haas wore galters with elastic sides, which made this possible." "After he had shot Heney yesterday, haas was searched by Police Captala Duke, Detective Burns and a police ofshot was heard from his cell, and when

Haas went to bed last night with his shoes on and again tonight, and when asked why he did this, said that he would rather sleep with them on. His wife called on him today, but two officers were present during the in-terview and they say she could not possibly have slipped the weapon to him.

"In December, 1898, at the time you "In December, 1898, at the time you were employed by me, there was pend-ing against the Standard Oil company, in the supreme court in the state of Ohio, a very difficult litigation. A pro-ceeding in contempt had been institut-ed by the attorney-general, charging that company with having wilfully vio. lated the order of the supreme court directing it to withdraw from the trust agreement. The company had answered, issues been made up, and a considerable volume of testimony tak-

"There was also pending against the Buckeye Pipe Line company a pro-ceeding in quo warranto, charging it with being a member of a trust in violation of the anti-trust laws of the state, also a like proceeding against the Ohio Oil company and the Solar Refining company, and one of a like charac-ter, at that time. I think, threatened against the Standard Oil company in Ohio, and which was brought in Janu-ary, 1899. These were so-called constit-uent companies of the Standard Oil

trust. "These bills in quo warranto were all filed in the supreme court and asked for the revocation of the charters of the said several corporations, the appoint-ment of receivers to take possession of the properties and the dissolution of the various companies. Many millions of dollars of property were thus involved



in the litigation already pending, and much imperilled in addition by other litigation threatened.

"It was in the midst of these difficult cases, with the very serious conse-quence incident to any adverse decision, that with the approval of my client I turned to you for assistance and ad-

CUBAN LIBERALS WON GREAT VICTORY
