Mt. Pleasant, Utah Co., April 27.—On the 25th Inst. a meeting of delegates from Fairview, Moulton, Spring City, Mt. Pleasant, and other commercial club rooms for the purpose of organizing a baseball league for this county. An organization was effected with the following officers: President, J. M. Boyden of Mt. Pleasant; vice-president, C. T. Olsen of Fairview; treasurer, W. M. Bailey of Moulton; Ropraim and Mantl will be given invitations to join the league.

It was decided that each team put up a forfeit of \$50; the schedule commencing about July 1st. The committee was apportioned to formulate by-laws which will be ready for the consideration of the officers about May 1st.

It was also decided that the home team receive all the gate receipts and the visiting team has expenses. No outside money making on the teams will be allowed to the town they are playing with.

An effort will be made to get merchants and business people to declare a half-day holiday each week and lend a helping hand in the "national game."

Pathfinder Automobiles Due at Twin Falls Some Time Today.

When Cars Will Race from Ocean Across the Continent—Rough Roads Encountered.
