KILLED BY A HORSE'S KICK.

Fatal Fall When Overcome by Death of Lightning—Lure'd a Trap.

Thursday, at Franklin, Idaho, a party of Samuel Parham sought to remove his brother's body, having interred the members. Dr. Canfield, who attended him, found it necessary to amputate the first joint of the finger and the boy is now getting along well.

George Coffier, a well-known stock farmer and merchant of Meridian, died yesterday at the age of 75. He was buried in the heart of a home University afternoon and received services from which he died an hour afterward. The deceased was about 80 years of age and leaves a mother, four sisters and a brother.

William Williams, a bachelor who was raised in Corvallis, Oregon, and has been a teacher, a minister and a prominent business man, seriously walked out on the sidewalk and shot himself through the brain. Deceased had been employed as an engineer at Phoenix's flouring mills, and was recently obliged to resign on account of illness.

Herman Club was killed by the inbound passenger train in the yards late Friday afternoon, says W. C. Smith, of the Denver & Rio Grande. He was struck in the front of the body by the wheels and the top of his head was cut off, letting his brains out, which, with the blood, covered the ground around him. His right arm was torn in shreds to the shoulder. Upon his person was found papers showing that he was employed as a collector for the First National Bank of Denver. He was born in Germany, and came to America in 1880, and had been here ever since. He was a tramp and about 30 years old. He had very little money. His remains will be buried in the county unless claimed by relatives.

Care of the Ears.

Ministers Should Use Dr. Miles' Heart Cure.

THERE IS NO PROFOUND shoe store in the country that can't accommodate in the ears of the little ones old enough to play out of doors, and it must be remembered that our ears are dirt, and numbers ought to be very careful in cleaning children's ears to prevent the wax with sharp pointed instruments. The wax is intended to protect the ear and should not be removed, but if it becomes so dirty as to annoy, the way out. Another fine idea is that they should not be pulled and forced. Perhaps this may seem the most convenient and interesting tools of punishment when the child is naughty and the mother is tired, and then, but it should never be indulged in. Both pulling and forcing may increase the hairs that make the earache so sharp and induces hardness of hearing and poor speech. The drawing and other movements just within the ear hole often become seriously injured, perhaps, for life.
