THE PRINCE OF WALES UPSET.

NOTES ABOUT ROYAL PERSONS—AMERICANS ABROAD—TWO IMPERIAL—TRANSPORTATIONAL NOTES.

London, Aug. 2.—[Special London Correspondent: Copyrighted 1895 by the American Press.]—The International Geographical Congress, which closed yesterday, involved nothing original in its proceedings or Arctic explorations. The American delegates to no degree, generally speaking, are willing with the decision to meet in Salt Lake, instead of Washington. General A. W. Greely was grievedly compelled and attributed the decision of the congress entirely to the conduct of Judge Charles P. Daly, president of the American Geographical Society.

General Greely said in a representative of the Associated Press: "Our international Geographical Congress did not go to America for next year, who are the members of the association, and the Americans are the most responsible." At a meeting of the American Geographical Society, General Greely, Jung, and myself stated that America was not ready for an international Geographical Congress. The Queen will give the state banquet to the London crew at Osborne in honor of Emperor William II, whose visit to England is to be followed by a royal reception for the Prince of Wales to host the royal yacht Osborne. For this entertainment a large quantity of the crown plate was sent from Osborne to Winetka.

The Princess of Wales is going to Caversham for the racing week and will proceed to Copenhagen and stay with her parents, the King and Queen of Denmark.

Prince Albert is the son of King Christian IX and Infanta Sophie, the great part of the immense fortune of his mother, Princess Louise, daughter of King Carl XV of Sweden and Norway, who was the most brilliant in Europe when she married Prince Albert on Sept. 24, 1863.
