CEREMONY WAS IMPRESSIVE.

On Behalf of Diplomatic Corps the Spanish Minister Felicitated Him.

Havana, May 20 .- President Palma was inaugurated at noon today in the presence of the diplomatic corps in full uniform, cabinet officers, senators. congressmen, judges, heads of departments, and the representatives of economic, agricultural and commercial argoclations. None of the Liberal members of Congress attended.

members of Congress attended. The imauguration ceremony took place in the red salon of the palace. The oath of office was administered by the chief justice of the supreme court in front of a dais, on which were seat-ed sight supreme court judges and the court officials. Over the central por-tion of a dais was supsended a can-opy of red, on which was the Cuban coat of arms. Freident Palma, who suppeared to be in the beset of health, entered the salon as the bell of the entered the salon as the bell of the palace was striking the noon hour.

The guns of the Cabannes forthess pealed forth a noisy welcome to the incoming administration, and lids was reinforced by the screeching of many whisites, cheers from the crowd outwhisties, cheers from the crows out-side the palace, and the crash of bands playing the Cuban rational au-them. Accompanied by Vice President Mendez Capote and the members of his cabinet, President Pulma advanced down the aisle, flanked on either side by members of the diplomatic corps, judges of the local courts, congress-men and guests.

men and guests. When he reached the dais the chief justice spoke briefly of the significance of the occasion. During the adminis-tration of the oath the voices of the president and chief justice were bare-ly audible on account of the poice of the celebration outside. Following the administration of the oath President Palma spoke briefly of his appreciation of the occasion and thanked those who participated in the inauguration.

participated in the inauguration, Senor Gaytan de Ayala, the Spanish minister, who is now dean of the diplo-matic corps, then advanced and read an address in behalf of all the mem-bers of the diplomatic corps, felicitat-ing President Palma on assuming an office worthily bestowed, and thanking him especially for his efforts to in-crease friendly relations between Cuba him especially for his efforts to in-crease friendly relations between Cuba and other countries. The address as-sured the president of the perfect con-fidence of all the powers represented in Havana. The president, responding, said that he appreciated deepty the honor tendered him at such a moment. Washington, May 20.-The railroad rate bill, the statehood bill, the dipiomatic and consular appropriation bill. the naturalization bill, the pure food bill, conference reports on the army and Indian appropriation bills are all possibilities of consideration in the national house of representatives this week. The certainties in this calendar of business are that Monday will be devoted to the passage of minor bills upder suspension of the rules. With the flibuster of the Democrats to pro-mote the statchood bill, the result will be comparatively small in the number of momentum and

of measures passed. The diplomatic and consular appro-priation bill will be called up Tuesday. priation bill will be chied up Tuesday, according to the present program. The diplomatic bill is a small measure and will require but a day or two at most in consideration, unless it is to be made the v-hiele for set speeches. The rate bill is likely to be made the subject of more or less discussion when the motion is made to send it fo conference. Fust what will be the

conference. Just what will be the character of this discussion or the length of time it will occupy cannot be essertained with any definiteness. The conferences on the statehood bill

indicate that a preliminary report to the two houses is a possibility for the the two noises is a possibility for the not distant future. While nothing definite can be said as to the charac-ter of this report, it is believed it will include a compromise on the basis of the Foraker amendment permitting the people of Arizona and New Mexico to vote separately on the subject of joint vote separately on the subject of joint statehood.

The pure food bill will be called up in the senate at all times when the ap-propriation bills or other privileged matters are not under consideration. The senate will resume business Mon

day by taking up the legislative, ex-ecutive and judicial appropriation bill, and when that is passed will probably enter upon the consideration of the immigration bill. Senators have been so engrossed with the rate bill during the past few months that they have given past few months that they have given very little attention to other questions. Consequently there is no well defined program for future legislation, and no one has definite authority to state what course will be pursued. But the imnigration bill is so generally favored by the Republican leaders that there is no doubt it will be given the next place of preference on the senate calendar.

There will not, however, be any fur-There will not, however, be any fur-ther effort at legislation aside from ap-propriation bills until the Republican steering committee can get together and decide upon a program, which will probably be some time during the week. The general disposition is to confine business to the supply bills as much as possible, but there is consid-erable division of opinion with refer-ence to the Panama canal bill, and also on the question of the discharge of the Philippine committee from the further Philippine committee from the further repaideration of the Philippine tariff
