

## PALMA IS MADE PRESIDENT OF CUBA

All Officialdom Was Present With Exception of Liberal Members of Congress.

### CEREMONY WAS IMPRESSIVE.

On Behalf of Diplomatic Corps the Spanish Minister Felicitated Him.

Havana, May 20.—President Palma was inaugurated at noon today in the presence of the diplomatic corps in full uniform, cabinet officers, senators, congressmen, judges, heads of departments, and the representatives of economic, agricultural and commercial organizations. None of the Liberal members of Congress attended.

The inauguration ceremony took place in the red salon of the palace. The oath of office was administered by the chief justice of the supreme court in front of a dais, on which were seated eight supreme court judges and the court officials. Over the central portion of a dais was suspended a canopy of red, on which were the Cuban coat of arms. President Palma, who appeared to be in the best of health, entered the salon as the bell of the palace was striking the noon hour.

The guns of the Cabanilla fortress pealed forth a noisy welcome to the incoming administration, and this was reinforced by the screaming of many whistles, cheers from the crowd outside the palace, and the crash of bands playing the Cuban national anthem. Accompanied by Vice President Mendez Capote and the members of his cabinet, President Palma descended the stairs, flanked on either side by members of the diplomatic corps, judges of the local courts, congressmen and guests.

When he reached the dais the chief justice spoke briefly of the significance of the occasion. During the administration of the oath the voices of the president and chief justice were heard in a loud and clear voice. Following the administration of the oath President Palma spoke briefly of his appreciation of the occasion and thanked those who participated in the inauguration.

Senor Gaytan de Araya, the Spanish minister, who is now dean of the diplomatic corps, then advanced and read an address in behalf of all the members of the diplomatic corps, felicitating President Palma on assuming an office worthy of his station, and thanking him especially for his efforts to increase friendly relations between Cuba and other countries. The address assured the president of the perfect confidence of all the powers represented in Havana. The president, responding, said that he appreciated deeply the honor tendered to him and a moment later he continued:

"This nation," he continued, "feels encouraged and strengthened by such manifestations made in the name of the representatives of so many friendly nations. I consider your words a happy augury for the new presidential period initiated today. The gratitude I owe you will be seen to bear fruit in a constant effort to further strengthen the relations, the cordial understandings and the bonds of sincere friendship fortunately uniting Cuba with the nations you represent. I raise my most fervent prayers to heaven for the happiness of all of you, and especially, sir, for the prosperity of Spain and the individual felicity of your august sovereign."

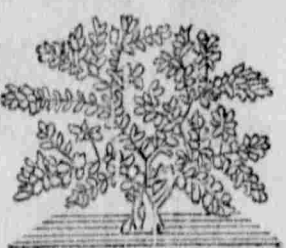
General congratulations then ensued, after which President Palma went out on the balcony and repeatedly saluted the crowd in the plaza and watched the troops file past. Later he gave a luncheon to the members of the cabinet, and throughout the afternoon held a general reception.

The celebration of Independence day was enthusiastic, but frequent heavy showers during the afternoon marred the occasion.

was celebrated at a banquet given by Minister Quesada at the Cuban legation today. The guests included Secy. Root, Senator Foraker, Admiral Schley, Gen. J. Franklin Bell, chief of staff, U. S. A., and the diplomatic corps of the various American republics.

Minister Quesada, in a brief speech, told of the services rendered by the United States to Cuba and of the latter's recognition of what this government had done for the island and its people. He spoke especially of the friendship of President Roosevelt and Secy. Root.

Responding, Secy. Root recalled the double which once were heard whether the Cuban republic would last more than a few months and expressed the satisfaction of the American people at the success of the government and the prosperity of the Cuban people. Secy. Root also discussed the coming pan-American conference at Rio Janeiro and his prospective visit to South America.

Primarily, he said, it was to enable him to get better acquainted with these countries and he hoped that it would result in a better understanding by them of the United States and of the United States of them. Secy. Root said that the United States had no desire for one inch of territory of any of them and the example of the policy carried out toward Cuba, he thought, should be taken as evidence of the government's disinterested policy in desiring to promote better relations with all the Latin-American countries and to help them in their progress.

The remarks of Secy. Root were received with enthusiasm by the representatives of the Latin-American countries. A message of greeting was sent to President Palma on motion of Senor Gaytan de Araya, congressman of Porto Rico in Congress, a message of congratulation was also addressed to President Roosevelt for his "notable participation in helping to secure the independence and contributing to the prosperity of Cuba."

Minister Quesada also added a personal message of greeting to the president.

### ENA'S FAREWELL TO HER NATIVE LAND.

London, May 20.—The arrangements have been concluded for Princess Ena of Battenberg's farewell to her native land. She will start for Spain on Thursday. King Edward will give a family dinner at Buckingham palace Wednesday evening, and as Queen Alexandra and Princess Victoria will return from London tomorrow from a cruise the family gathering will be complete.

A special turbine steamer is prepared to take the bride-elect of the Spanish king and a large suite from Dover to Calais, from which place they will proceed by train. The Prince and Princess of Wales, who will represent the king at the wedding, will start for Madrid next Saturday.

The wedding presents have been on view for the last few days at Kensington palace in the historic apartment where the late Queen Victoria held her first council.

King Edward's gift is a magnificent state dessert and coffee service of the finest English porcelain.

## CONGRESS WILL HAVE BUSY WEEK

About All the Bills One Can Think Of May be Under Consideration.

### DISCUSSION OF THE RATE BILL

Quite Likely to be Considerable When Question of Sending it to Conference Comes Up.

Washington, May 20.—The railroad rate bill, the stretched bill, the diplomatic and consular appropriation bill, the naturalization bill, the pure food bill, conference reports on the army and Indian appropriation bills are all possibilities of consideration in the national house of representatives this week. The certainties in this calendar of business are that Monday will be devoted to the passage of minor bills and Tuesday to the consideration of the rate bill. With the filibuster of the Democrats to promote the stretched bill, the result will be comparatively small in the number of measures passed.

The diplomatic and consular appropriation bill will be called up Tuesday, according to the present program. The diplomatic bill is a small measure and will require but a day or two at most in consideration, unless it is to be made the vehicle for set speeches.

The rate bill is likely to be made the subject of more or less discussion when the motion is made to send it to conference. Just what will be the character of this discussion or the length of time it will occupy cannot be ascertained with any definiteness.

The conference on the stretched bill indicate that a preliminary conference to the two houses is a possibility for the not distant future. While nothing definite can be said as to the character of this report, it is believed it will indicate that the government's policy of the Foraker amendment permitting the people of Arizona and New Mexico to vote separately on the subject of joint statehood.

The pure food bill will be called up in the senate at all times when the appropriation bills or other privileged matters are not under consideration. "The senate will resume business Monday by taking up the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill, and when that is passed will probably enter upon the consideration of the immigration bill. Senators have been so engrossed with the rate bill during the past few months that they have given very little attention to other questions. Consequently there is no well defined program for future legislation, and no one has definite authority to state what course will be pursued. But the immigration bill is so generally favored by the Republican leaders that there is no doubt it will be given the next day of preference on the senate calendar.

There will not, however, be any further effort at legislation aside from appropriation bills until the Republican executive committee can get together and decide upon a program, which will probably be some time during the week. The general disposition is to confine business to the supply bills as much as possible, but there is considerable division of opinion with reference to the Panama canal bill, and also on the question of the discharge of the Philippine committee from the further consideration of the Philippine tariff bill.

There is very strong pressure to secure consideration of the canal bill this session, while the preponderance of opinion in the Philippine question appears to be against the re-opening of the subject. The conference report on the Indian appropriation bill will be presented during the week, and will be taken up for consideration as soon as it is received. The report on the first day of legislation will be made late in the week, and it, too, will receive early attention.

### A TRIPPLE TRAGEDY DOWN IN KENTUCKY.

Mayfield, Ky., May 20.—A triple tragedy occurred tonight at Lynville, this county. A visitor to the warehouse owned by Mark Wilson, a prominent merchant, found the proprietor, his wife, Mrs. Wilson, and Arthur West lying on the floor shot to death. Revolvers were found besides the bodies of Arthur West and West Wilson. Two citizens reported that they had been at the warehouse shortly before 7 o'clock tonight and left the trio apparently on good terms, although all had been drinking. The supposition is that West Wilson and Arthur West engaged in a shooting affair, killing each other, and that one of the bullets struck Mark Wilson.

### PEACE CONFERENCE PROTOCOL.

The Hague, May 20.—The government has submitted a bill asking the second chamber of parliament to approve a protocol which Russia wishes the signatures of the convention of 1894 to sign on assembling for the second peace conference which declares that the powers not represented at the first conference but which have been invited to attend the second shall, by acceptance of the invitation, become adherents to that convention.

### MR. POTTER ON WASHINGTON.

London, May 20.—Bishop Potter of New York preached today at All Saints church, Garsdon, near Malmesbury, where it is proposed to restore the monument to Sir Lawrence Washington, an ancestor of George Washington. Bishop Potter's sermon drew a comparison of Napoleon, Wellington and Washington and eulogized Washington, whose name, he said, was idolized in Europe and for whose memory it was intended to restore the memorial the perpetuate a great name and lineage.

### BASEBALL PLAYER DROPS DEAD.

Sawhwa, Mich., May 20.—During a ball game today Carl Stouder, aged 18, dropped dead of heart disease as he reached first base after driving a liner into left field in the second inning.

### TO UNITE BAPTISTS AND FREE BAPTISTS.

Dayton, O., May 20.—Definite steps to bring about union of the Baptists and Free Baptists were taken when the American Baptist Home Mission society in session here today. The committee appointed last year to consider a plan for cooperation and possible union reported that after conferences a joint committee of Baptists and Free Baptists unanimously agreed that, since the two denominations are closely related and the original cause of separation has disappeared the committee should recommend a free interchange of members and ministers, and the extension of a cordial invitation to the Free Baptists to cooperate in Evangelistic, educational, missionary and all other denominational work, in the hope that a complete organic union of these bodies might be consummated in future. This recommendation was unanimously adopted by the Home Mission

Baptists wherever it can legally be done. The Home Mission society, in view of the vote to raise \$175,000 to help rebuild the wrecked and burned churches in California, will begin a vigorous campaign throughout the north and northwest. The reports show the greatest year in its history, with receipts of over \$800,000 and 1,542 missionaries employed. Two missionaries from Cuba and Porto Rico report good progress in the islands within the past five years, over 50 churches having been established, with more than 3,000 members. Nine great evangelistic meetings were held tonight in different parts of the city.

### ONE KILLED, THREE HURT IN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT.

Erie, Pa., May 20.—One woman was killed and three other persons are in the hospital here in a serious condition as a result of an automobile accident on the lake road shortly after midnight. The party had left Cleveland early in the evening to make the run to Erie, with the intention of going on to Buffalo this morning.

In turning a sharp curve at high speed the machine crashed into a telegraph pole, throwing the occupants out, and the machine turned over on top of them.

Mrs. Julia G. Young, 26 years old, wife of Albert W. Young of Cleveland, is the name of the dead woman. She was killed almost instantly by being dashed against the telegraph pole and sustaining a fracture of the skull.

The injured are: Carl E. Schurmer, Cleveland, both legs broken.

W. H. Schurmer, father of Carl, right shoulder broken.

A. W. Young, husband of the woman who was killed, was badly bruised.

Mrs. W. H. Schurmer and E. C. Miller, the chauffeur, escaped with but slight injuries.
