

I was much pleased yesterday while perusing a copy of your last issue of the Semi-Weekly News, to learn that Prof. Smyth, of Salt Lake City, is making efforts to introduce the Tonic Sol Fa methods of teach ing and learning vocal music. That method was first introduced into England upwards of thirty five years ago, by Mr. John Curwin, of London, and its beauty and simpli-city soon attracted much attention, and choral unions were-established n most of the counties of England It was also used very extensively for congregational singing, psalmody, etc. Most, if not all the great Oratorios were transposed into this method, such masterpieces as Handel's "Messiah," Hay den's "Creation," Mozart's "Twelfth with much greater facility and ac-corracy than they possibly could be in the old, or standard notation. The Tonic sol fah system of vanl music, over the standard, is the dispensing with semi-breve, minime, crochets luavers, semi quavers, lines and spaces, cleffs, etc., and using simply the solfeggio characters, or their in-itials, as s for Sch, d for dob, etc., and with the addition of dots and dashes to indicate the length of each note the Tonic-sol-fah musical score proceeds. Every whole tone or emi-tone in the natural scale has its name, and h, de tay re, me, fah, etc., ascending, and the same descending, and the student becoming boroughly famillier with these olfeggio names and their respective

solleggio names and their respective tones in their alphabetical order, whilst practicing upon the Modulator, has only to learn the dots and dashes which indicate the time, and he will be enabled to ing almost any piece of music in this notation at eight. Therefore, the reading of music is represented. the reading of music is rendered much easier than it is by crotchete and quavers, etc. Basides this, the eition from one key to another, in the course of a piece of music, is made much easier, from the fact that the sol-fah, name of the desired key, is placed beside the note requir-ing transition, and the vocalist pro esds without any embarrassm or, at least without straining his neck to produce the exact "sharp" or "flat," or three flats, as the case may be, as encountered in the old notation. The ton's sol-fah method of music is not adsp'ed for instru-

mental music, but it seems to have been created specially to facilitate the practice of vocal music. Its chief feature being simplicity.

I have in my possession a certificate that was awarded me while a member of the Birmingham Tonic Sol Fah Union, some twenty-two sears ago, and I can wall recollect the time I recolved the news that Mr. David O. Calder was teaching this method at Falt Lake City,

This system of music commends itself for its simplicity, and I am of the opinion that the simplest is the best whether in learning music, language, science, ethics or religion,
