

DISTRICT FORESTER FOR STATE OF UTAH

Gifford Pinchot Selects for the Position Clyde Leavitt of the State of Michigan.

HEADQUARTERS LOCATION.

Ogden and Not Salt Lake Was Chosen Because of Greater Convenience and Economy of Living.

Washington, Oct. 7.—The district foresters who will be in charge of the six field districts of the forest service, beginning Jan. 1, next, have been selected by United States Forester Gifford Pinchot.

They and their headquarters are as follows: District 1—Missoula, Mont., W. B. Greeley of California. District 2—Des Moines, Smith Riley of Maryland. District 3—San Francisco, F. E. Olmstead of Connecticut. District 4—Ogden, Utah, Clyde Leavitt of Michigan.

All the district foresters are men of technical training and most of them have been members of the forest service for several years. Ogden instead of Salt Lake City was fixed upon for headquarters of district 4, because of greater convenience and economy of living.

EX-LIEUT. E. H. MARTIN CHARGED WITH MURDER

Portland, Or., Oct. 7.—Edward Hugh Martin, lieutenant in the United States artillery corps and son of a wealthy New York real estate broker, will be placed on trial today, charged with the murder of Nathan Wolff, in the circuit court.

Port of the case will likely extend over a week or 10 days. The securing of a jury will be taken up the first thing this morning. This jury must be at least two days, if not longer. Then will follow opening statements, final argument and deliberation by the jury. The state's testimony being chief of a circumstantial nature, will have to be induced with deliberation and in the face of continual legal fighting.

The Nathan Wolff murder was committed on the night of May 1, Wolff a publisher, was found murdered in his shop. He had been shot and necked with a bullet. The murder occurred about 11 o'clock. It is believed, and the body was found shortly after dark. The murderer robbed the store of jewelry. There were evidences of a struggle with the murderer.

LT. F. F. EVANS' CASE.

Manila, Oct. 7.—The taking of testimony in the case of Lieut. Frank T. Evans of the battleship Louisiana, court-martialed on a charge of absenting himself from his post while officer of the deck, disrespect to his superior officer and intoxication, was concluded today. There remained only the summing up by counsel and it is expected that the proceedings will end tomorrow.

The chief contest by the defense was against the allegation of intoxication, and in this respect the evidence is regarded as favorable to the accused officer. Surgeon Andrew R. Wentworth of the Louisiana and others testified that Evans, in their opinion, was not intoxicated.

Lieut. Evans admitted, during the hearing, that he had left the deck while on watch, but produced evidence to show that he went below to quell a slight disturbance.

WILL NEVER DRIVE AUTOMOBILE AGAIN

Having Crippled a Boy for Life Chauffeur Cornwall Takes Solemn Oath.

CHILD'S LEG IS AMPUTATED.

Run Over by Great Touring Car—Pleaded That Author of His Injury be Not Arrested.

New York, Oct. 7.—Standing over the body of the little boy and the big automobile he had been driving had crippled for life Edward S. Cornwall, a chamberlain of Brooklyn, solemnly raised his right hand and took an oath never again to drive an automobile as long as he lived.

"I have a little brother at home just the age of this boy," said he, "and the thought of crippling him and blighting his life as this boy's life has been blighted makes me shudder. I will never drive another car."

On the sidewalk sat little Tommy Ward, aged 9, quivering convulsively. His right leg had just been amputated there in the street by an ambulance surgeon, and the fact that just concluded an eloquent plea that Cornwall be not arrested.

Tommy Ward with several companions was running to a fire when the big touring car, driven by Cornwall, and in which Mrs. Walter Nollman and Mrs. William L. Nollman, wife and mother, respectively of the owner of the machine, were riding, struck him. The youngster fell and the wheels of the car passed over his right leg, mauling it terribly.

The boy was brave and uttered no outcry. He was picked up and carried to the sidewalk. While the surgeon was amputating the boy's leg Cornwall stood by and the two women cried hysterically. It was felt that Cornwall took an oath never to drive another car.

LOST FOR TWO DAYS IN SIERRA MADRE MOUNTAINS

St. Louis, Oct. 7.—Lost in the Sierra Madre mountains in El Paso, Texas, nearly two days, J. M. Brown, of St. Louis and his sister finally found shelter and aid when they were famished and almost in a state of mental collapse. News of their predicament was received here last night by telegraph.

Mr. and Miss Brown stopped off at El Paso en route from Los Angeles, Cal., to their home here, and returned Sunday in the mountains. They got a Mexican guide and started out early Sunday for a day of mountain climbing, but were met by a stranger, a stranger to the mountains. Mr. and Miss Brown wandered about and finally found themselves in a deep canyon, the sides so rugged that they could not climb out. Their quest for an exit continued throughout Sunday night and all day Sunday until after dark they attained a high point and could discern the light of Juarez, and near daylight reached a herder's hut along the trail.

AERONAUTIC EXPERIMENTS.

New York, Oct. 7.—The Aero Club of America has appointed a new committee to investigate available sites within convenient distance of New York, where aeronautic experiments may be conducted. By this action the club shows that it intends, if possible, to carry out the policy advised several months ago of devoting particular attention to the progress of aviation.

Although the committee appointed at that time made a careful survey of several localities within a few miles of the city, the sentiment of going slowly prevailed among the officers and it was virtually decided to postpone further operations until the success of the Fort Myer tests were assured. Now that the Wright brothers, both in this country and abroad have demonstrated the ability of their machines to remain in the air for long periods with two passengers, the belief has freely been expressed that the time will soon come when a number of club members will have their own aeroplanes and will be just as keen to take an afternoon's flight in them as automobile owners are for an afternoon's drive through the park or out in the suburbs.

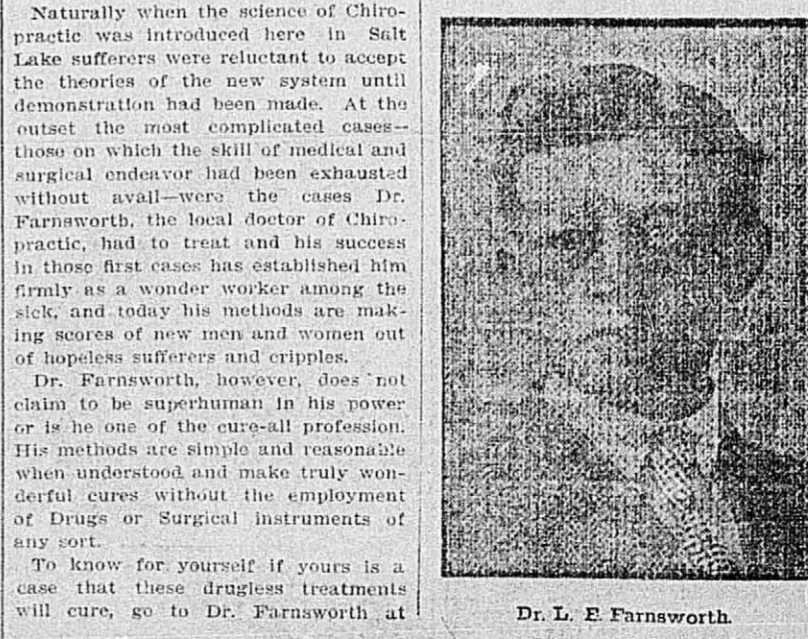
