

## JAMES BARRIE WANTS A DIVORCE

Author of Play "When a Man's Single" Longs to be Single Once Again.

### "WHAT EVERY WOMAN KNOWS"

May be Ground for Proceedings: At Least It Shows His Understanding of Women.

New York, Oct. 7.—The announcement from London that James Barrie, the playwright, had petitioned the English courts for a separation from his wife, who was Miss Mary Ansell, an actress, has created much comment here, where Mr. Barrie and his plays are well known. The idea of divorce in connection with the author of "When a Man's Single," seemed incongruous. The wonderful grasp of feminine character, which Mr. Barrie has shown in his books and plays, has always been supposed to have been inspired in some degree by his perfect agreement with his wife. Such plays as "What Every Woman Knows," indicated to the critics that he had a most remarkable grasp and understanding of the character of woman.

Charles Frohman, the manager who produced most of Mr. Barrie's plays, declared that Barrie's success with character for women was due to the fact that he knew that when a woman trusts her instinct and humors her reason and logic, she was apt to be right. Mr. Frohman recalled an incident during a rehearsal of "What Every Woman Knows," when Mrs. Barrie suddenly appeared and held a hurried whispered conversation with the author. When she had gone Mr. Barrie arose and remarked to the manager: "You know the humiliating thing about woman is that they are generally right."

ment in the very near future of an international federation of labor, the autonomy of the trade union movement of each country being ordained and guaranteed," said Dr. Lyon, secretary of the American Federation of Labor today, after dictating a wireless message to be delivered to Mr. Gompers on board the transatlantic French liner La Savole, now in mid-ocean headed for New York.

The message informed Mr. Gompers that the court of appeals of the District of Columbia had not handed down its decision in the case of the appeal in the contempt proceedings in the Bucks Stove case, in which Mr. Gompers has been sentenced to imprisonment for 12 months.

"The general purpose of an international federation of labor," continued Mr. Morrison, "will be for the protection and the advancement of the rights, interest and justice of the wage workers of all countries and the establishment of international fraternity and solidarity. The organization may not be consummated this year, but it will not be long delayed."

### PRISONER OF PESTS MAKES BIG RECORD

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 7.—More than 50,000 prairie dogs have been killed by J. W. Holman, the officially recognized United States government poisoner of the pests in the southwestern states, during the last eight months. And Mr. Holman is not through yet. He is here now obtaining a new supply of strychnine and will start out on a second crusade within a few days.

"I am going to kill at least 150,000 dogs during the next eight months," said Mr. Holman today. "The prairie dogs are a serious pest in the southwest. They are destroying pasture land and their burrows make it dangerous for burrowers. They cannot be trapped or shot, but it is easy to poison them by placing strychnine on wheat, which they eat readily."

The government pays Mr. Holman 15 cents a bushel for killing the dogs.

### NO BEVERAGES IN ROOM OF MICHIGAN HOTEL GUESTS

Saginaw, Mich., Oct. 7.—Hotel bell boys in Michigan will have to stop carrying beverages from the bar to guests in their rooms according to Deputy State Factory Inspector Frank Wood, who says that his department believes that the practice has a bad effect on the morals of boys.

"There is a state statute which makes it an offense to hire boys to do anything which demoralizes their character," said Deputy Wood, "and under it we are going to proceed. We are prepared to notify hotel proprietors in the state that boys under 21 years of age must not be allowed to serve drinks."

### KING'S MOUNTAIN DAY COMMEMORATED

Charlotte, S. C., Oct. 7.—"King's Mountain day," the anniversary of the battle of King's Mountain, S. C., in which 900 brave "mountain men" won a victory over the British forces, numbering 1,200, on Oct. 7, 1780, during the struggle for independence from Great Britain, was fittingly commemorated today in both South Carolina and Tennessee.

On the battlefield a monument which has been erected by the United States government at a cost of \$30,000 was dedicated.

At Fort Watauga, near Johnson City, Tenn., the point from which the men under Campbell, Shelby and Sevier started for King's Mountain, the daughters of the American Revolution dedicated another monument.

Valdez, Alaska, Oct. 7.—United States Judge Overfield signed a decree today forfeiting the Japanese sealing schooner Kinkai Maru, which was seized by the United States revenue cutter Bear in July, 1908, for violation of the sealing laws. This decision also affects the forfeiture of the schooner Salkai Maru, similarly seized and accused. The schooners, with their equipment, stores and cargoes of 46 and 24 sealskins, respectively, will be sold at Unalakleet by the United States marshal.

Not wise to discuss tobacco troubles

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 7.—A humorous description of Kentucky's traditions and tribulations of the insurance business was given today by Charles W. Bell, state insurance commissioner, in welcoming the National Association of Fire Underwriters at their annual convention here.

"It would be improper and imprudent," said Mr. Bell, "for you to enter into a discussion of our tobacco troubles. You may, if you choose, venture to discuss this matter at your pleasure, but if you have left a dependent family behind I suggest that you increase your life insurance policy before going on."

Mr. Bell said that Kentucky's reputation of being rather careless of human life was undeserved.

### BIG FIRE IN VAN WERT, O.

Van Wert, Ohio, Oct. 7.—The department store of Bonnewitz & Company and the hardware store of Jones & Tudor were destroyed by fire last night. Loss \$300,000.

### SUFFRAGETTE AINSWORTH GETS NO SUMMONS

Birmingham, England, Oct. 7.—Laura Ainsworth, the tube-fed suffragette, who was released from jail here Tuesday, applied to a magistrate yesterday for a summons against Home Secretary Gladstone, the governor of the prison, and the prison physician on charges of assault.

Miss Ainsworth alleges that on one occasion her mouth was forced open by a steel instrument and her nose, throat, legs and arms were forcibly held while a feeding tube was inserted. In consequence of this treatment she suffered from congestion, inflammation of the throat and nervous prostration, and lost 12 pounds in weight.

The magistrate refused to grant the summons, declaring that acts done in process of law did not amount to unlawful assault.

### NAVY ENLISTMENTS ARE IMPROVING

Washington, Oct. 7.—Naval officers are very much encouraged over their success in securing a fine class of recruits and over the generally satisfactory condition of the enlisted personnel. Tables on this subject have been compiled by Commander W. R. Shoemaker in charge of the enlistment branch of the bureau of navigation. From these it appears that there are now 44,123 enlisted men in the navy, as against 23,827 in 1907, and that the percentage of citizens has increased from 82.1 per cent in 1907 to 95.7 per cent in 1909. The percentage of native-born men in the navy has increased from 82 per cent in 1907 to 88.4 per cent in 1909. Steady increase is shown in enlistments. In 1907 the total was 14,229, while in 1909 the total enlistments numbered 18,721. The result of the strict requirements for enlistment is shown by the fact that out of 92,000 applicants this year for admission to

the navy, all but 15,723 were rejected for physical or other causes. Another cause for congratulation is the large and steady decrease in the number of desertions from the service and the large percentage—63 per cent—of re-enlistment.

In 1907 the desertions averaged 5.04 per cent. In the total enlisted strength of 44,123 are included 441 Filipinos, who are in the insular force of the navy yard.

### RUSSIAN DISPUTE WITH GERMAN CONSUL SETTLED

St. Petersburg, Oct. 7.—The foreign ministry has announced the settlement of the dispute at Harbin between the German consul there and the Russian authorities over the refusal of the proprietor of a German brewery to pay certain taxes.

The consul has officially admitted that the brewery was no claim to German protection and at his orders the German flag has been taken down from the brewery building.

The German consul at Mukden has assumed charge of the situation and proceedings have been begun against Russian subjects for insulting Russian officials.

### FRENCH EXPERTS TO AMERICA.

Paris, Oct. 7.—The large increase in French exports to the United States under the new tariff law, noted first in September, is continuing in October. The figures for the first six days of October from the district of Consul General Mason alone show 7,901 invoices valued at \$14,097.91, as against 6,725 invoices valued at \$8,472.17 for the corresponding period of 1908. The increase is 30 per cent.
