## A FEW WORDS FROM A GENTILE.

Editor Deseret News:

In your last week's issue I was surprised to find an account of the Gentiles expelling from their employ persons who claim to be "Mormons." My object in writing you this, in brief, is to say that if the "Mormons" in those parts were so vicious and illiberal as to expel the Gentiles from their employ those would be a great number going fasting and wishing for something to eat.

Ever since my return to Utah (this being the second time) I have been in the employ of "Mormons" and can say that better men and women, can't be found outside of this Territory to work for than this much-despised and unjustly persecuted people.

I have lived in Utah for nearly five years of my life and have always found all the work I could do from the "Mormons," and my treatment and pay have been good. Let me say frankly that if I were under straitened circumstances I would have more confidence in applying to a "Mormon" for help than I would to a Utah Gentile.

I have seen Gentiles who have been traveling in this country, as well as those located here, who have been out of money, provisions and friends, and who on stating their lamentable condition to the extremely good Gentiles of the country, and asking for help, have been politely told to go to that benevolent time-worn institution called H. E. L. L.

I have found it very different with the "Mormons." I have seen them divide the last morsel in their house with their bitterest enemies—the Gentiles—when they did not know where the next mouthful was to come from.

'Tis not to pause when at my door  
A needy brother stands,  
Nor ask the cause that made him poor  
Or why he help demands.

'Tis not to spurn that brother's prayer,  
For faults he once has known;  
'Tis not to leave him in despair,  
And say, "You, tramp, begone."

In conclusion, let me say to all the Gentiles coming to Utah and those located here, that what causes so much Gentile cavil towards the "Mormons" is that the "Mormons" treat the majority of them better than they merit.
