

Fierce Bravery Displayed by the Turks at Plevna.

On the north side the news came that Osman Pasha was heading some 20,000 troops, and already driven the Russian advance lines. He had crossed the Vid, and was aiming at Etropol. Thither dashed several of the staff. Meanwhile, the Russians, southerly and easterly, closed in upon the Turkish entrenchments, capturing some easily, but paying a terrible price for others. The Moslems waited until the foe was within 400 yards, and then swept the line with a murderous fire. The Muscovites never hesitated nor faltered, but carried one position after another by storm. Enthusiasm grew into fury, and whole columns rushed through musketry fire as if it carried no death. But the Turks exhibited a despairing bravery. Again and again they formed in line and met the advancing foe at bayonet point. Toward afternoon the Turkish fire began to fail, and it was evident that their ammunition was exhausted. But their courage had not failed. In the trenches or in the open field they checked, more than once, the impetuous Russian charge, and had it not been for the Muscovite guns, the battle would have proved too dear for the object of the prize. Whenever the Turks formed to resist or make a stand, there was concentrated the fire of Russian guns. Whole battalions were well nigh swept away.

But at Etropol, where Ghazi Osman commanded in person, the fight was demoniacal. They bore down on the Russian positions with a fierceness and steadiness that nothing could withstand. Cheered on by the words "Allah! Allah!" ringing in the air, they tore through abrapnel and musket shots until the ground was darkened with their dead. They leaped into the entrenchments, and there, hand to hand, struggled in a death struggle with their hated foes. They swarmed the redoubts, and sprung on the Russian gunners like so many tigers. Their reserves came fearlessly forward, and had to pass through a converging fire that made gaps in the ranks at every stride they marked. Nothing daunted, they rushed to the aid of their brethren in front. But the Russians held on bravely, and fought with a steadiness and an undaunted courage that outlasted the lionlike courage of the Osmanites. Gradually the Roumanians bore down upon the Turkish flank, and from the west the Russian troops swept in upon the lines. Closer and closer the allied troops hemmed in their foes, and thinner and thinner grew the Turkish ranks. At length Osman, who fought as only a Turk can fight, grew weary of the slaughter, and ordered a retreat. It was too late, the enemy had surrounded him, and Plevna was already in the hands of the Russians. With a last attempt he strove to pierce his narrowing bounds. He fell, and with him the Moslem hope and Moslem bravery fell, too. The confusion became terrible. Whole divisions flung down their arms. The artillery batteries ceased their fire, the infantry dashed their muskets against the gun carriage wheels. At length a flag of truce was visible. It was near Osman Pasha. Some fifty Cossacks rode forward, and were followed by Gen. Granetzky and other officers. Supported by two officers, Osman Pasha, handing his sword to the Russian General, said: "To the Emperor, through you, I surrender my sword and my army." Thus, after six hours' heroic fighting on both sides, Plevna fell, and its gallant defender and his army became the prisoners of the allied Russo-Roumanian troops.
