## Probate Court.

Order made by Judge Birchett today:

Testimony should be properly distributed, and he paid his expenses with the restive stock, and the balance to the widow held under the terms of the will.

Estate of Alsey Hodges, deceased; hearing on distribution cause set on continuance. Proof of passing agreement. Continued trial of the further testimony. Attorney instructions and tack deposition for correction.

Estate of James Shields, deceased; hearing on motion for new trial and motion for a writ of habeas corpus on resuscitation. Motion argued. Order made granting new trial, and right of notice of appeal entered and noted.

## A SOURCE OF DANGER.

Large Numbers of "Tin-Tex" Found Floating in the City Watercourses—Scientific Examination.

A few days ago a citizen brought to this office several small, snake-like worms which he had taken from his hydrant in a pair of water. They are found in the city watermain in great numbers, and vary in length from half an inch to an inch and a half.

The specimens were given to Dr. James E. Tammy, after making an examination replied as follows:

The animal specimens found in a pair of water are probably the species examined. Take them to be good food specimens of fresh water worms, belonging to the class Trematoda. In some cases they are a bright red color, and under the microscope a great number of similar worms as a source of danger, on account of their small size, and their tendency to cling to the delicate tissues of the dead worms. Please let me know what water the specimens were taken.

## A BOLD BURGLAR.

Pleads Not Guilty, But is Very Much Depressed in Spirits.

George Coulter, the bold burglar who entered the residence of Constable Campbell near the corner of First West and Third South streets, was arraigned in the police court this forenoon. He was instructed by the court that he need not plead guilty, but his counsel did so.

He was tried in a fast business suit of black which had been considerably torn in his effort to escape from Officer Hill. He plead not guilty and the default of \$500 bonds he was remanded to the county jail until morning at 10 o'clock, at which time the preliminary examination will take place.

Coulter seemed to be very much depressed in spirits, and the court directed him to have a physician to know what the result would be. The evidence against him is overwhelming and there is no question but he will have to serve a term of years in the penitentiary.

## AROUND THE COURTS.

Active preparations are going on for the trial of the defendant in the second term of the Third District Court next Monday. The grand jury room is being equipped with the necessary furniture, and the accommodations of the jury during the deliberations of that body.

Balfie George Walton, who has been confined to his bed with a severe spell of sickness for a week or ten days past, was expected to be well enough to make his office for a short time today. He is but a shadow of his former self, and his recovery promises to be slow.

The United States Commissioners had no case before them this morning.

He had a bright idea, however, and put his money in a tiny hamper and went back to his home in San Francisco. The police were notified and arrested him. ## A SALT LAKE HOTEL RUNNER.

Charged With Robbery From the Per-  
son Outside a Hotel.

A LONG MEETING OF THE COUNTY  
COURT.

How the Sons of the Curtis-Ballifan  
Fight Was Received in the "Garden  
City."—A Successful Law Student.

In Justice Oishi's court yesterday, C. A. Caswell, a Salt Lake hotel runner, came up on the charge of robbery. He waived examination and was bound over in the sum of \$500 to await the action of the grand jury. It appears that on Tuesday night E. J. Ward of this city was seated in front of the Chamberlain Hotel. He happened to fall asleep, and upon awakening the watch and chain were gone. Marshal Brown was notified, and yesterday succeeded in locating the right person. Caswell was arrested at 3:30 a.m. in the Pacific depot, and had in his possession the watch and chain.

The September term of the District court will open on the 15th inst. Yesterday Judge Blackmun in a few civil cases which will be tried at the beginning of the term.

The committee appointed to examine into the qualifications of Samuel W. King for admission to the bar reported favorably and Mr. King took the prescribed oath. He leaves for Ann Arbor, Mich., about the 20th of this month, where he will continue his law studies.

The County court had a long session yesterday and considerable business transacted. School lands situated in various parts of this county were leased for various prices, all ranging according to the value of the land. Reed Knott asked to join the entity in putting in a sewer on Main street from J. H. Referred to Judge Jones and Selectmen Knott and Mr. Smith also stated that the United States government had agreed to obtain some square miles for holding the District court, and he desired to know if the county would be willing to terminate its lease with the government and have the government hold the buildings and provide the necessary rooms for the government.

Selectman Jones moved that the county terminate the lease on a formal application being made.
