NEVADA MINING LAW.

Shafts 450 Feet Deep Must be Provided With Safety Cage.

At the recent session of the Nevada legislature, a bill was passed making it unlawful for any person, company or corporation after July 1, 1905, to sink or work through any vertical shaft at a greater depth than 450 feet unless the shaft is provided with an iron-bonneted safety cage, to be used in the lowering and holsing of the employes; also any shaft less than 450 feet deep, where no safety cage is used, and where a cross head or cross heads are used, plat-forms for employes to ride upon while coming up or going down the shaft shaft be placed above the crossheads. The provisions of the act require the placing of these platforms on the cross heads.
